

STORY OF THE STAMP.

The history of the introduction of adhesive postage stamps is recalled by the granting of the contract for the supply of such stamps for the United Kingdom to Messrs. Harrison & Sons, of St. Martin's Lane, London. The adhesive stamp was first made experimentally, says the Times, by James Chalmers at Dundee, in August, 1834. There was, for a long time, a controversy as to whether the credit of the invention did not belong to Sir Rowland Hill, and it seems to have been proved to the satisfaction of those who have investigated the matter closely that Sir Rowland Hill belongs the credit of priority of publication, while Mr. Chalmers rightly claimed priority of invention. At the same time a very definite contradiction is given by Sir Rowland Hill's daughter in Sir Rowland Hill's Story of a Great Reform, which was published in 1907, to many of the statements which found acceptance in an article on the post office in the Encyclopaedia Britannica. A daily paper of the period thus commented upon the innovation: "Considerable diversion was created in the city today (May Day, 1840) by the appearance of the new penny-post devices for envelopes, half-sheet letters, and bits of sticking-plaster for dabbing on to letters.

Withal the citizens are rude enough to believe that these graphic embellishments will not go down at the price of 1s. 3d. per dozen for the envelope, and of 1s. 1d. per dozen for the sticking-plaster." The first day's sale yielded £2,500, but the Mulready envelopes proved unacceptable, whereas the postage stamp presses had to work day and night, and yet failed to cope with the demand. The difficulty of finding a means of obliterating the stamps without damaging the letters was considerable. Improvements in the manufacture of stamps were speedily introduced. Sir Rowland Hill's brother Edwin was appointed supervisor of stamps at Somerset House and turned his attention to the machinery for making postage and other stamps. Mr. Perkins, of the firm of Perkins, Bacon & Co., invented a process for stamp printing, and in the first 40 years of the reformed postal system he printed probably 21,000,000,000 of penny adhesive stamps alone. Later the contract passed into the hands of Messrs. De La Rue, who had for some time printed stamps for a few higher values than the penny and two-penny issues. A notable improvement was introduced in 1853, when, for only £4,000, pursuant to the recommendation of a select committee of the House of Commons, the rights of a perforating machine invented by Henry Archer were secured by the government.
