In connection with the death of Mrs. Stetford Mullins and child, Tryon, which occurred some months ago, acknowledgement should have been made of a sympathetic resolution presented by the officers and members of Court Petrel No. 384 to Mr. Mullins. Such acts of kindness go far to make easier the trials of life.

The services of the steward of the S. S. City of London have been dispensed with for allowing passengers with liquor in his state room and accepting of their liquid hospitality. It is very evident that the management of this popular steamer will not tolerate intemperance in any form on board when plying on her several routes or in port.

It has been arranged that the Royal Commission on Transportation will meet in St. John on July 24th. The commissioners will hear anyone who has a plausible statement to make or pertinent evidence to offer. It is understood that this commission, which has been nearly ten years in existence without being heard from to any great extent, will submit a report in October or thereabouts, dealing with transportation problems east of Winnipeg. The commission as now constituted includes Robert Reford of Montreal, chairman, E. C. Fry of Quebec and James H. Ashdown of Winnipeg. The secretaries are C. N. Bell of Winnipeg and J. H. Perreault of Montreal.

METHODIST SCHOOL OF MISSIONS.—Beginning on Monday evening July 31st and closing Saturday Aug. 5th at noon, this "School" will be held in Centenary Church, St. John N. B. STRAWBERRIES are rapidly becoming scarce, and it is altogether probable that they will not be any cheaper than they are at the present. The big rush came on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week, and while larger quantities were expected on Thursday and Friday they failed to arrive. Yesterday the river steamers brought down only fair quantities, and these sold at an average price of eight cents per box by the crate, though some could be had at seven cents. Around town some grocers are selling nice berries at three boxes for a quarter. Reports from up river are to the effect that continued warm weather has so dried up the plants that the berries are not filling, and that unless rain comes soon the season is liable to end abruptly.—St. John Sun 15th.

The sailing committee of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club has decided that the trial races for the selection of the Canada Cup challenger from the three candidates, Temeraire of Hamilton, Toronto, and Nantux of Zoraya, will be held here, commencing July 22. It has also been decided to change the skipper of the two Toronto boats in the races here this week, in order to effectually settle the question of superiority. Also that the skipper of the challenger, no matter who he is, is to be allowed a free hand in selecting his crew.—Halifax Chronicle.

A LARGE meeting of the people of Dundas and Bridgeport was held in the Court house at Dundas on Tuesday, the 11th, to protest against the steamboat service now being conducted by the S. S. Inverness.
