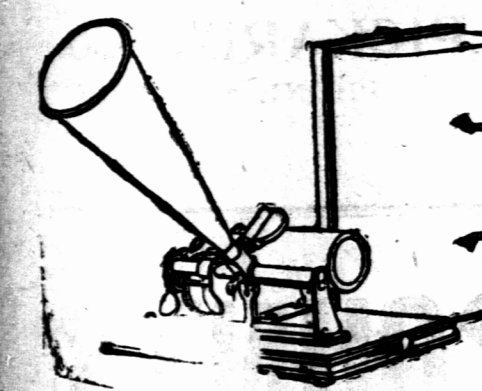

W. H. Newsome of Newsome & Gilbert, the well known typewriter man of Toronto, is in the city on a business trip.

The steamer *Louisburg* of the Black Diamond Line arrived yesterday morning with 2,500 tons reserve run of mine coal for Peske Bros.

As the result of a small sample order sent some weeks ago to a town in Northern Ontario the Condensed Milk Company received a telegraphic rush order yesterday for three hundred cases of Victor Cream.

Yesterday the merchants of the city who are subscribers to the telephone exchange presented Miss Annie LePage on the eve of her marriage to Charles Black, Bedeque with a purse of gold Mr. and Black Mrs. left yesterday afternoon by the western train for their home. A large number were at the station to see them off.

T. GEDDES GRANT, of Port of Spain, who left for home in the *Ocean* yesterday has been all over Canada. He went to the Pacific coast with the other delegates of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire and afterwards visited all the manufacturing centres in Ontario and Quebec. He spent the last two months in Nova Scotia. Mr. Grant is hopeful of a largely increased trade between Canada and Trinidad.—Halifax Chronicle.

The scope of the fishery commissions duty will include in addition to the investigation of herring, sardine, lobster and oyster fisheries and the close season relating thereto enquiries into the dog-fish pest. The latter subject was added when the appropriation of \$10,000 for the expenses of the commission was before parliament. The commission, it is said, will have to visit and take evidence at all the fishing districts in lower New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island. Prof. Prince, who is to be chairman of the commission, is now in Scotland, but it is expected he will return about the middle of the month. Though names have been mentioned in the newspapers, the personnel of the commission has not been fully agreed upon.

James H. Russell of St. John thinks he has invented an ice-plough that will remove the difficulties of crossing the Northumberland Straits during the winter. Mr. Russell is the inventor of the well known Russell snow-plough which is giving such good satisfaction, and he has been experimenting on an ice-plough several years. His invention not only includes an ice-plough but also a steamer in which passengers and baggage can both be conveniently carried. The plough is 100 feet long and 70 feet wide. The material of which the steamer and part of the plough will be built is lumber 12 inches square of the hardest possible wood, riveted and bolted together in the most solid manner. The keel, hull and walls of the vessel are of the same material and treated in the same way. Mr. Russell calculates his vessel will draw about 10 feet of water. The whole of the steamer like the plough is covered with a steel covering making a good protection against the ice. The inventor thinks that the steamer should go at the rate of ten miles an hour with a maximum of 15 miles. He calculates that when the vessel is going at 10 miles an hour and the plough is ripping up ice ahead of it that as these pieces are tossed back on the sides of the plough the speed at which the vessel is going will be sufficient to hurl them a distance of 20 or 30 feet on one side thus getting rid of the possibilities of the broken ice closing up the passage. Mr. Russell thinks the Canadian Government would put a boat like this on the Northumberland route between the mainland and the Island. It would run the mail service regularly and there would be no need of two mail boats being frozen up during a portion of the winter. He estimates the cost of his boat at about \$300,000 and as soon as the government orders one constructed Mr. Russell is ready to build it.—Sackville Post.
