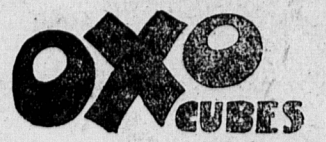

WON \$150,000 DECISION. ST. JOHN, N. B., Feb. 23—Word was received here today that the King Lumber Mills, Limited, of Cranbrook, B.C., in which New Brunswick people are chiefly interested, has won its suit for \$150,000 against the C. P. R. for damages to its lands by fire.

SHUSTER IS STILL TALKING. NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—W. Morgan Shuster, who arrived today said: "England dealt civilization and progress a foul blow when she set to work to create a strong Russia after the Japanese war. The British people are beginning to realize this now and they will see it still more clearly in the next ten years. In its endeavor to outpoint Germany in the European diplomatic game, the British foreign office has paid a stiff price for something which will never be delivered—Russian support against Germany. FEAR FISH FAMINE. CHATHAM, Ont., February 22.—Fishermen fear a fish famine in local waters next year. The shallows of Lake St. Clair, and the fish being hemmed in have slowly starved to death. Others have been frozen right in the ice.
