He was a son of the late James Kiley, and was honorable and straightforward to a degree. He was a man of unselfish, quiet and generous disposition and of a kindly, refined and gentlemanly manner. While he had hosts of friends wherever he was known, it is not known that he had an enemy, and by his death this place loses one of its most upright residents. He goes to his long rest honored and regretted by the community. He has been for many years a most prominent magistrate and his career as such has been an honorable one. Every case placed in his hands was given the most searching and careful consideration, the minutest detail of each being diligently considered before giving his decision thereon. As a magistrate he was unequalled here and he will be greatly missed as such. He was, in short, a good resident, a good husband, and an affectionate father and highly respected wherever known. He leaves a widow and two sisters, Mrs. Wm. Praught, CharloTTetown, and Mary Isabella Kiley, Boston, Mass., and the following daughters and son: Mrs. Wm. Thorson, Fitchburg, Mass.; Mrs. Henry Dunn, and Mrs. D. Jamieson, Sturgeon; Mrs. W. H. Bull, Murray Harbor; Miss Maggie Kiley, Boston, Mass., and John Roach Kiley, White Sand. He was laid to rest amid tears in the R. C. Cemetery, Sturgeon.—Com.
