propriating to his own use the sum of \$20,000 on deposit of \$20,000 of the Bank of Montreal. The witness for the plaintiff included Henry Gallagher, R. B. Kesson and S. F. Stanger, Attorney-General Grimmer in reviewing the cases for the Crown, stated that Gallagher had deposited the sum of \$2,477.00 at the Charlottetown Branch of the bank, the money being received by Clark and entered by Gallagher's pass-book. After Clark had left town Gallagher was informed that his account was overdrawn and on investigation it was shown that he had not been credited with the amount sent to deposit. Mr. Grimmer contended that Clark had received the money and that he did not credit it to Gallagher's account. Mr. Kesson in his evidence said that the regular bank inspection in May did not reveal anything irregular although irregularities had existed. The inspection was of value on account of its moral effect. As a general thing information of irregularities had to come from the outside. Clark in giving evidence on his own behalf said that he knew William McBeath, the bank first having had transactions with him from the latter part of 1910 to the end of March 1911. The time Gallagher's cheque was paid in, there was in the hands of the teller a slip showing the amount of indebtedness against McBeath. He handed the cheque to the teller with instructions to deduct the amount from the McBeath overdraft. Collins and McBeath were mixed up together but the bank had no business with any of their associates. Herbert H. Smith Manager of the St. John Branch for J. C. McIntosh & Co., of Halifax, remembered the transaction with the Bank of New Brunswick, in February 1911, having received a
