A St. John despatch says:—At the Immigration Convention, under the auspices of the Fredericton and St. John Boards of Trade, to be held at Fredericton on the second day of the session it is proposed to discuss the following among other subjects:—A protest against the Harvest Excursion; that it should be made just as easy for the excursionists to get back East as it was for him to go West. The desirability of running excursions from Ontario and Quebec to the Maritime Provinces. The necessity for greater publicity for the Province. The importance of closer co-operation between the farmer and the man in the city. The importance of the farmers and dealers in the Province welcoming and assisting the immigrant. The establishment of a central bureau, where immigrants could refer for reliable information and assistance and the solution of difficulties natural to strangers coming into a country, the customs of which they are not familiar with. The re-creation of settlements. The establishing of a state bank for assisting of agricultural development. Following is a list of organizations etc., that have been asked to send delegates to the Convention:—Boards of Trade; Agricultural Societies; New Brunswick Members of Federal House; Members of the Local House; Mayor and one delegate from each town in N. B.; Warden of each County; Farmers' and Dairyman's Association; Fruit Growers' Association; Editors of all N. B. papers; Transportation Companies; Representatives of Ontario, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island Immigration Departments; Minister of the Interior; Minister of Marine & Fisheries.
