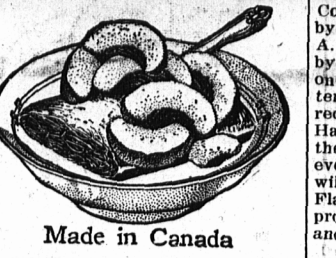

RUMOR CONTRACTED- Mr. C. W. Judson has received a letter from his son, Malcolm, of the 105th P.I.S., who is in the hospital in England after arriving there from Canada, and it was reported here that he had died there. This was a "grossly exaggerated" report it seems, for Mr. Judson writes his father that he is well again, and has re-joined his battalion.

Mr. Malcolm Power, Tracadie, yesterday received the following despatches: OTTAWA, Sept. 23. To M. Power, P. E. I. Deeply regret to inform you, No. 171,361, Corporal Edward Joseph Power, Mounted Rifles, officially reported died of wounds at No. 1 Canadian General Hospital, Staples, Sept. 21. A gunshot wound in back.

Deceased who was thirty-five years of age and the son of Mr. Malcolm Power, Tracadie, left Charlottetown about twelve years ago for North Bay, Ont., where he worked in the employ of the C. P. R. His father has not heard from him since a year ago. Last Christmas, though up to that time he had written him regularly. This sad news of his death was the first intimation his people had that he was on overseas service. He was a brother of Mr. Fred Power of the P. E. I. R. Charles, in his death is the first break in a family of seven. There is one brother, John, in Tracadie, and four in Massachusetts, and one sister, Mrs. A. A. Mitchell, of Tracadie.

Corporal Power was formerly employed in the office of Mr. Poole, of L. M. Poole & Co., Charlottetown. Mr. Saturday also brought news of three more Islanders wounded, William G. Silliker, of O'Leary, and Harry Kirk, of Summerside, and Harry Bonness, of Montrose.

The members of No. 5 Siege Battery held their farewell Sunday Church parade in Charlottetown yesterday dividing between St. Peter's Cathedral and St. Dunstan's. At St. Peter's the Church was crowded and the service which was that authorized by the Department of Militia and Defence for the 19th camps was entered in very hearty prayer by the men. Rev. Canon Simpson preached a very forcible and timely sermon to the men, taking his text from the words in II Timothy, 23: "A Good Servant of Jesus Christ." He exhorted the men while fighting against the foes of the Empire not to forget their spiritual foes. He referred to the temptations to which the men would be subject to in barracks life and the need of prayerful watchfulness. The three vows-probably, intemperance and immorality were pointed out as the chief enemies which the soldier is tempted and should be on his guard against continually. Concluding Canon Simpson said: "As you go forth to take your part in this struggle of might against right of the mailed fist of Germany against the nailed hand of the crucified Christ, my prayer for you one and all is that Almighty God will protect you in all dangers, temporal and spiritual and bring you back unharmed in body and soul for the praise of His glorious name."

At St. Dunstan's Cathedral there was also a very large congregation at the service which the soldiers attended. Rev. Leo Herrell was the preacher, and he delivered an excellent sermon. The parade of the Battery which was headed by the Fourth Regiment and which played decidedly well, was witnessed by many hundreds of citizens and was perhaps the best parade yet held on Sunday.

The following appeal has been received by Lt.-Col. Jenkins: Toronto, Sept. 20th, 1916. Dear Sir or Madam:-

The necessities of the British Red Cross Society in England are so great, and the work undertaken by it so extensive, that it has been found necessary to again appeal to the Dominion of Canada for assistance in an Empire-wide movement to collect funds for the sick and wounded. Lt. Col. Jenkins, the President of the British Red Cross Society, has, therefore, issued an appeal to our Society for such help as it is within our power to give in the collection of funds, and the 19th of October has been fixed for the day upon which such an appeal should be made to the people of Canada.

The Executive Committee of the Canadian Red Cross Society is in hearty sympathy with the movement, which will be extended to all the Dominions beyond the Seas, and is desirous that the Canadian Red Cross Society, shall make that day a day of response worthy of the people of Canada, and our Society. It has been decided to leave to the Provincial Authorities all arrangements necessary for the successful carrying out of the object in view, as the appeal has been made to H. R. H. the Governor General and the Lieutenant Governors of the several Provinces, but it is hoped that the Canadian Red Cross Branches will give every assistance to local Committees which may be appointed by the Provincial Authorities.

The Executive Committee, therefore, commends this appeal to you in order that steps may be taken to organize at once in such a manner as to produce the best results. It must be clearly understood that the money collected for this Fund should be altogether the result of a special appeal on that day, and that grants should not be made from the already subscribed funds to the Canadian Red Cross Society in the hands of the several Branches.
