Mr. Carleton reported that there was yet to be collected taxes to the sum of \$90. The advisability of securing a steam engine and more hose to be used in fires was discussed at length. J. J. Hughes then addressed the meeting and spoke of the good work of the past and hoped that the coming year would find even greater progress in the pretty town of Souris. LOBSTER RAREBIT IN CANS LATEST DISH (Continued from page 1.) ly on its spelling for a place in the international Hall of Fame. Canned lobster has been on the market for years. The eastern provinces of Canada annually export 10,000,000 cans of canned lobster. Their cash value is \$3,000,000. But there has been a terrific waste in canned lobster. All they use in eating the chorus girl dainty is the meat in the claws and tail. The whole of the body proper has been thrown away by the canners. They say they can't can the body. But they can in Prince Edward Island. A P. E. I. lobster packer, with a fondness for Welsh rarebit, was tired of sending to Wales. "What's the matter with lobster rarebit?" he said, "I'll use the body of the lobster, which is now thrown away." From the rejected part of the lobster this packer selected the crescent-shaped meaty layers to which the tail is attached, the liver and part of the roe, which contains the eggs. The liver is black in the live lobster. Boiling the lobster turns the liver green. The meat and roe are run through a chopper. Then they are mixed with the liver in the following proportions: Meat—Six tenths. Liver—Three tenths. Roe—One tenth. Dash of spice. This compound is steamed and canned like ordinary canned lobster. It is called canned lobster rarebit and is pronounced appetizing and healthy. Physicians say that it is good for certain ailments and is highly nourishing. It is interesting to note that the roe of an ordinary lobster contains 5,000 to 40,000 eggs, according to the size of the animal. The number of thousand eggs one gets in a full order of canned lobster rarebit is not figured out, however. A tremendous trade in canned lobster rarebit is expected by the energetic packers of Prince Edward Island. But it's an awful bump to the rarebit industry of Wales.
