With the pleasure of walking over the smooth new concrete sidewalks which the city fathers have provided on portions of Queen, Great George and other central thoroughfares, comes an increased sense of the rotten, dilapidated and dangerous condition of many of the wooden footways.

Of course, repairs and renewals ought to have been made in the early spring. In many cases nothing short of entire renewal can meet the pressing demand, but much might be done by patching up and stopping the holes. The dangerous holes may be counted by hundreds. In a few days we will have the "home comers" in our midst, and already many tourists have come and others are coming from day to day.

discredit, as a valued correspondent has done, of the really shocking condition of many of our sidewalks. Not an hour should be lost in patching up as best may be, and making our streets passable for pedestrians.

BRIGHTON BEACH NUISANCE.

It now transpires that Brighton Beach is the officially recognized burial place for defunct animals; that the sanitary officer on being applied to instructs the owners or persons in charge of such dead quadrupeds to remove them to this particular locality and there bury them in the sand at low water; that this is done sometimes under the eye and direction of the said officer, sometimes half done, and sometimes the carcasses are merely thrown on the beach or into the water.

It is obvious that something must be done to rescue this valuable bathing beach from desecration restore it as a place where human creatures can resort and bathe if they so desire without being

poisoned, and to bring about better conditions generally. To that end some other place must be found for the burial of dead animals where it will not interfere with public health, comfort or convenience, and the burial must in each case be supervised by a responsible officer.

THE CITY'S PROPOSAL.

The City Council has promptly met one of the offers of the Light and Power Company with a counter proposal the substance of which is elsewhere stated in this issue. The Council seems to take it for granted that the body of citizens will justify them in renewing the contract for city lighting provided the terms are fair.

We do not know how the Company will view this counter proposal. Their contention has been that they cannot furnish electric light for 10 cents per kilowatt, nor gas for all purposes at \$1.50 per thousand feet. We trust that on mature consideration they may conclude that with improved and perfected equipment they may be able to do this and still have a fair margin of profit.

Japan had last year the largest rice crop, the largest manufacturing output and the largest foreign trade in her history. The budget shows a surplus. But the cost of the war is heavy, reaching \$725,000,000 down to the beginning of April last. Of this \$500,000,000 was borrowed and the balance raised by extra taxation. Just now another loan of \$150,000,000 is being floated.

Four times since the beginning of 1901 the Sheffield, England, gas company has reduced the price of gas to its customers. In 1901 the price was 53 cents and 49 cents according to quantity consumed. In March last, after paying the usual dividend of 10 per cent and having a handsome surplus over, it was decided to reduce the price to 35, 32 and 28 cents, the average being 34 cents per thousand.

FARMERS' INSTITUTE OF LOTS 27 AND 28.

The Institutes of Lots 27 and 28 met at Tryon on the 28 inst to hear and receive instructions from the Government Delegates, Messrs. Anderson and Moffatt as to the best type of a dairy cow. With some five or six cattle, there was ample opportunity for object lessons and although the day was warm from fifty to sixty farmers enjoyed themselves under the excellent shade trees of A. Morrison's garden, while the address given by Mr. Anderson and the instructive methods introduced by means of his score-cards was a treat not often met with and which no man, claiming to be a farmer, could afford to lose.

The Hon. the Minister of Agriculture occupied the chair and in a few well chosen remarks he assured his hearers that the Government were desirous to do all in their power to stimulate the farming industries of the Island. Mr. Moffatt being called upon addressed the meeting along the lines of the necessity of more and better educational training, also the necessity of the farmer making his choice of breeding-stock, and standing by that choice. Grade up by means of the very best sires obtainable and by a vigorous system of weeding keeping only the animal that is found to pay.

Mr. Anderson upon coming to the platform spoke more particularly on the feeding of the dairy cow and the preparation of the soil to produce that feed. The fertility of the soil must be maintained, and in order to do so, carry all the stock possible. He strongly recommended a system of short rotation, not longer than four years on land that could be mowed, and three where no manure could be obtained; also heavy seedling with clover, at least nine pounds of clover seed and four pounds of Timothy per acre. He claimed to want three things to insure success, viz., the soil, the climate, and the man; and while success might be attained without the former two, it was impossible without the man. He concluded his remarks by asserting that no feed of which he knew comes nearer summer conditions than well-cured clover-hay.

A unanimous resolution was carried:—That our Institute hold a picnic on the grounds of G. W. Cameron, Augustine Cove, on Thursday afternoon the 20th instant. The Institute agrees to provide all the strawberries necessary. Members and visitors (who will be welcome) are to provide cream and other necessaries. Speakers will be provided for the occasion.

After a hearty vote of thanks passed to the delegates, the meeting adjourned, all present pronouncing it one of the best, if not the best, we ever attended.—A. S. Wright, Secretary pro tem.
