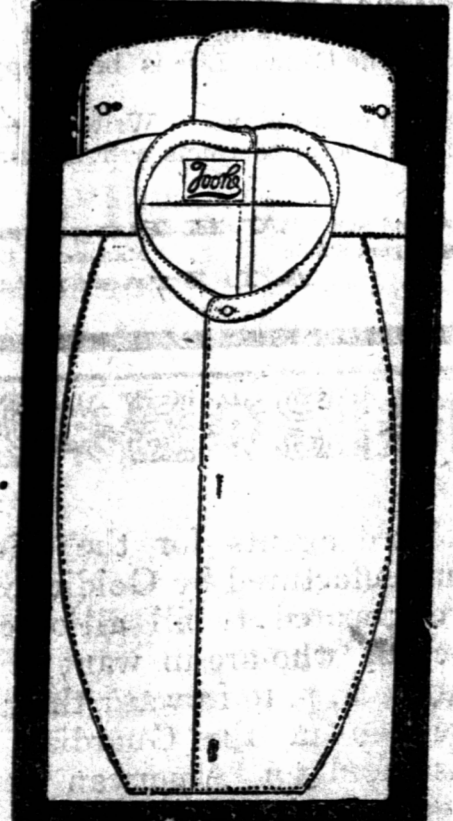

By some means a rumor was circulated in the City that the Fire Department is poorly equipped with hose, and in consequence we might be at the mercy of the flames in case of a big fire. At the Harper's factory fire with five streams playing and another reel at the fire not in use, there was still 500 feet of good hose in reserve at the station.

STAFF Sergeant Gough of Summerside, of the South African Constabulary, who was amongst those who arrived out on the Parision at Quebec last week. The troops with which Sergeant Gough served was in the Rustinburg district, and was mostly composed of Canadians. Only seven hours before peace was declared the troop fought the last engagement of the war, at Bank, near Rustinburg. There were only fifty men in camp, and the Boers numbered 500, and had prepared a trap for the British on a V shaped ridge. However, the Imperial troops avoided it, and had only a couple of casualties, including a man from Nanaimo, named Percy Devereux, and E. A. Webb, of Vancouver.

BULUWAYO, Sept. 8.—Owing to an outbreak of rabies in Rhodesia, the native commissioner met the native chiefs and explained the disease to them. They promised to destroy all dogs except favorites. This means the destruction of from 60,000 to 80,000 dogs. The government will destroy the hyenas.
