CHURCH SYNOD STILL OPPOSES

A Permanent Deaconate but Favors Christian Unity.

QUEBEC, Sept. 13.—(Special)—At today's session of the Synod the proposal to establish a permanent deaconate was defeated fifty to thirty-five.

This suggestion was that certain persons be ordained deacons for the purpose of assisting the clergy in the services. They would not give up their business nor take holy orders except in exceptional cases.

It was unanimously resolved to continue the committee on Christian union, not because there is any immediate prospect of union with any other body, but because the existence of such a committee will encourage any steps toward unity that may be taken in future.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE HIGH COURT FORESTERS

Opened in Castle Hall, Prowse Block Yesterday

The Annual Report Given by the High Chief Ranger Chas. Murphy, Summerside—Other Reports Submitted.

The twelfth annual session of the High Court, I. O. F., of P. E. Island, opened its first session in Castle Hall, Charlottetown, yesterday forenoon.

The printed reports of the officers were on motion considered as read and distributed.

HIGH CHIEF RANGER'S REPORT

The report of the High Chief Ranger, Charles Murphy, first referred to the general progress of the Order. The membership of the Order on 1st July, 1904, was 231,628, showing an increase of 10,700 members.

The report also referred to the work done during the year in our own High Court Jurisdiction. On 1st July, 1904, the Order in this Province had a membership of 1,801 and during the year ending 30th June last 175 new members were secured.

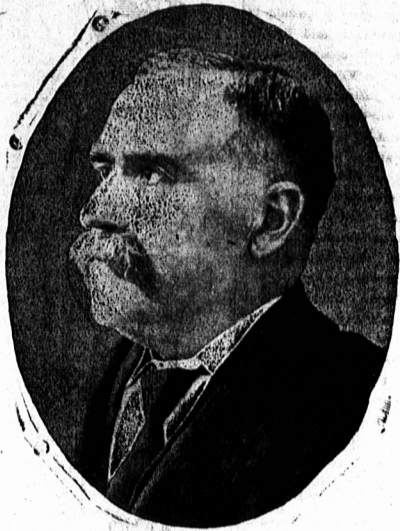

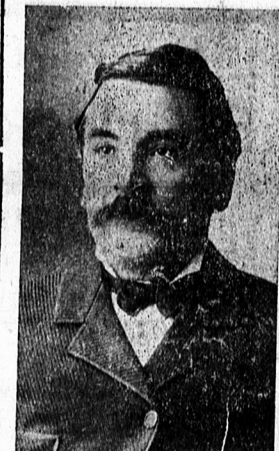

After reading and confirming minutes of previous session, Bro. L. U. Fowler, representing to the Supreme Court, reported on the recent work of that body.

Considerable discussion arose over the matter of claims made to the High Standing Committee by certain Courts and members as awards for securing new members. These claims the Executive did not pay because of non compliance with the printed circulars; and the action was sustained by a large vote of the High Court.

At the evening session L. U. Fowler read the following telegram:—"Please convey greetings to your High Court and best wishes for session. Regret not to be with you."

The High Court agreed that under certain conditions District Deputies of the High Chief Ranger be appointed whose duties shall be to visit and stir up the several subordinate courts within their jurisdictions.

AN AGED LADY BURNT TO DEATH

In Toronto—She Read in Bed and Left Lamp Burning.

TORONTO, Sept. 13.—(Special)—Lying near the door of her bedroom where she had been overtaken in her effort to escape, the charred body of Mrs. Beal, aged sixty-three was found today after an alarm of fire had been given.

The woman was in the habit of reading her Bible in bed every night and the fire originated from the lamp which she had left burning when she fell asleep.

SEEKING HIS WIFE IN BOSTON

H. C. Fraser Calls in the Aid of the Boston Police.

BOSTON, Sept. 13.—(Special)—H. C. Fraser of Amherst, N. S. called at the police headquarters today and asked the police to help him find his wife, Margaret N. Fraser and his seven months old daughter.

Both disappeared from his home September 2. He followed them to Vancouver where he found they had taken the train for Boston.

Fraser says that his wife had needlessly worried over the condition of his business and that this probably caused her to leave home.

Mrs. Fraser is 22 years old 5 feet 8 inches in height, weighing 120 pounds and of dark complexion. She has no friends in Boston and is supposed to be wandering about the streets.
