LIVES LOST WHEN VESSEL WENT ASHORE

Ella M. Rudolph, 60 Tons, Wrecked on Nfld. Coast - Other Vessels in Distress as Result of Storm.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 7. - Eight lives were lost when the schooner Ella M. Rudolph drove ashore at Brook Cove near Catalina, during the height of last night's storm.

The schooner left here yesterday for Greens Pond and shortly after sailing ran into the storm.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 7. - The steamer Hillcroft with her bunkers empty and all her movable wood-work used as fuel was wrecked today in the tremendous storm.
