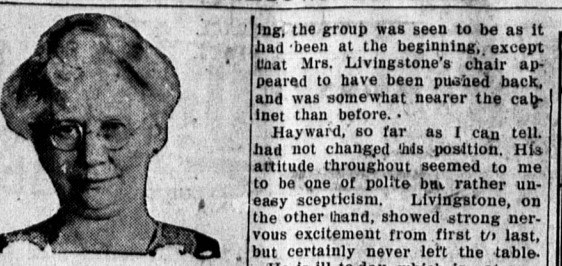

Better Treatment meted Out To Harvesters

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 25. — Co-operation between harvesters from Eastern Canada and the farmers of the West this year has added another chapter to the more friendly relations sought between worker and employer.

Many distressing tales have been told of the hardship and harsh treatment meted out to the workers in former years, who when unfavorable weather prevailed, were forced to shift for themselves, in many cases with only limited funds, until the rain clouds had lifted and permitted field operations to continue.

The men, in many instances, drifted back to the Prairie cities when it was time for harvesting to be resumed, the farmers found themselves without help, and consequently suffered costly delays before securing new workers.

With the shortage of help this year, the farmers have realized the problems of other years and in many districts of Western Canada, instead of discharging the workers until more favorable weather conditions prevailed, have aided the harvesters, fed them and in general, made life more pleasant for them. This is not true of all sections, but is becoming more general than ever before.

An example of genuine co-operation comes from the Claresholm district of Alberta. Through the inclement weather of recent date, while rains and snow pelted the grain fields, the harvesters in the Claresholm district were housed and fed, and the farmers, towns-people and rural municipal officials co-operated. The men did the mowing, cutting and provided entertainment for the residents of the district. On Sundays the men attended church in a body, and made many friends throughout the locality. When threshing was resumed, Claresholm farmers had field workers available, willing to co-operate in the work of gathering, threshing and hauling the grain to market.

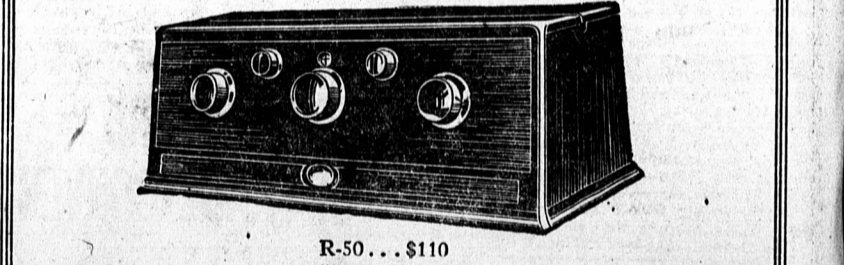
