WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Change of prohibition headquarters in Maine from Bath and Lewiston, on account of more central location and better railway facilities, was recommended to Commissioner Hayes today by Seth May, federal prohibition director for the state. Mr. May reported to Mr. Hayes that a programme of co-operation with Canadian officials was being worked out for exchange of information to suppress smuggling over the 800 miles of Canadian border.

Morse Expected To Return Home

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Developments in the case of Charles W. Morse, of New York, whose transactions with the shipping board are under federal investigation, appeared tonight to await his return to this country from France.

While it was announced at the shipping board that Morse had been stopped at Havre after having "fled the country" upon learning of the board's investigation, the government's next move was not disclosed. However, Elmer Schlesinger, general counsel of the board, said that with the cooperation of Attorney General E. A. Tamm and the State department such steps had been taken as in their opinion were necessary to secure the return of Morse to this country.

Morse's reported willingness to come to the United States was said by department of justice officials to imply matters, although officials discussed the possibility of a warrant being obtained against him upon which his extradition could be asked of the French government. The department's course of action was as yet understood, it was said tonight.

Charges that "a deliberate effort has been made to prosecute and defame Mr. Morse" were made in a formal statement tonight by his attorney, Wilton J. Lambert.

Weekly Market Notes

There were 1929 cattle, 984 calves, 4066 hogs and 2232 sheep and lambs on the two markets for week ending Dec. 1st, compared with 2705 cattle, 1065 calves, 2761 hogs and 3439 sheep and lambs for the corresponding period in 1920. Features of the market were the comparatively small number of hogs and calves, the lack of any cattle of quality and the fact that the bulk of the butcher cattle were offered on the East End yard, which is patronized chiefly by the butchers. Prices on all grades of cattle were materially advanced during the week. The greatest gains were made on cattle that could be used for butchery grade. These grades were said to be about \$1.00 higher than they were two weeks ago. The absence of anything pertaining to standard quality and coming to market, the offering makes it difficult to give representative quotations. The top figure \$5.50 was paid for 21 cows of a fairly good feeder quality but to be slaughtered averaging 320 pounds and also for a number of good suckers, around \$3.00. Grassers were higher at \$4.75 to \$2.00 and bologna bulis a little firmer.

There were no top wool calves. The top good suckers brought \$3.00 to \$9.00 with an old sate up to \$9.50. Grassers were a bit firmer, selling in most cases for \$2.75 and \$3.00.

Receipts of sheep and lambs were only a little over half of last week's receipts, and the market was strong, demand sold at an average of 25 cents over last week. The top for good lambs was \$5.00, with the bulk selling around \$3.00 to \$3.25. The supply of sheep continues heavy in comparison to last year's receipts and also when compared to last year. The sheep were sold generally in mixed lots and brought from \$3.50 to \$4.00.

and declares: "Surely the duty of the Department of Agriculture is evident. We should do everything possible to find an outlet for this great food surplus."

The United States certainly did not put any surplus against us, they might buy more. We are asked to provide an open door for American surplus food products whilst they have closed their doors against us.

Some politicians would have us believe we are not importing food products from the United States and that they are buyers, instead of sellers, I, et us, exclaim. In 1920 we imported over 21 million dollars worth of pork products; about three million dollars worth of eggs and nearly the same value in oat, in cereals alone, we bought upwards of half a million dollars, which alone will give you some idea that we have a mighty good market in Canada for food-stuffs and can use no little amount from outside. In 1921 they shipped us over ten million pounds of mutton and lamb; eggs to the value of two and a quarter million.

There seems to be an impression the U. S. requires our food products and on this score I would refer you to the reports issued by the U. S. Department of Commerce, dealing with exports of meats and you can readily see for yourself whether these people really require our goods.

U. S. exports for the month of October last:
Hams and shoulders—12,110,000 lbs.
Bacon—23,556,000 lbs.
Lard—58,070,000 lbs.
Lard compounds—4,026,000 lbs.
This does not include beef or pickled pork and large quantities of this is exported also. Dealing with the exports of bacon and hams for ten months, ending Oct. 31st of this year, they exported 578 million pounds and during the same months in 1920 (that is 10 months) they exported 668 million pounds of hams and bacon. Now I ask do you not think the people of the United States good exporters, that is good sellers and do you think if we duplicated the Foreign Tariff, would it not hurt

Much Smallpox In St. Stephen

CALIAS, Dec. 5.—Following an outbreak of twenty-five cases of smallpox in St. Stephen (N. B.), just across the line from Calias, Canadian District Health Officer George G. Melvin issued sweeping notice today compelling every resident of St. Stephen who had not been vaccinated within seven years to do so at once. Schools excepting one has been closed and doctors are doing a rushing business in vaccination.

Calias fortunately is free from smallpox, but has one case of diphtheria. Calias health officers have advised the vaccination of school children and others will be vaccinated starting December 2.
