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EXPLOSION OF FREIGHT ENGINE

FRANCE DEMANDS DEATH SENTENCE

PARIS, July 30.—There was a great and increasing popular clamor for the carrying out of the death sentence imposed last Tuesday upon a man named Sollellant, for the murder of a life guard particularly atrocious circumstances, especially as it has been discovered that the Chamber of Deputies has passed an appropriation of \$5,000 for public executions. It was thought when Sollellant was sentenced that his execution was impossible because of the lack of this appropriation, but now it is known that the appropriation passed the Chamber of Deputies during the confusion of the closing days of the session by a majority of twelve. This fact escaped public notice at the time. The time allowed by law for Sollellant to appeal from the death sentence expires tomorrow at midnight.

PRINCESS PAT TO WED MARQUIS

LONDON, July 31.—Just a week ago the Marquis of Anglesey entertained the whole Connaught family at dinner. As the event was strictly a private affair little notice of it was taken in the press, but the event was of more interest than most people imagined at the time of its occurrence, because it is understood now as a fact that the Duke and Duchess of Connaught have at last consented to recognize the young Marquis as a sutor for the hand of Princess Patricia.

FIRE LOSS IS OVER \$100,000

Destruction of the North River Lumber Company's Plant Complete

NORTH SYDNEY, July 29.—The fire which destroyed the North River Lumber Co's mill at St. Ann's on Sunday night, was probably the worst conflagration that has ever visited Victoria County. The company's big mill which was equipped with the most modern mill machinery and appliances, was totally destroyed, and the loss of this part of the plant alone, will exceed \$100,000.
