## THE MARKETS.

### MONTEAL.

Oct. 22—Butter. The 4 to 6c reduction from last week's figures still insufficient to meet buyers. Business rather dull. Creamery 18 1/2 to 20c, dairy 15 to 16c lb. Cheese—At the close of the summer season is still fairly up, prices having advanced 1c to 2c during the past week; prices range from 8 1/2 to 9 1/2 c. Eggs—Quiet market with strong undercurrent of prices so that the price of fresh 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 c. and storage 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 c.

Apples—Sales of several thousand barrels. No. 1 winter varieties are reported at \$1.75 on track, a lot of 2 cars at \$1.75 to \$2.00 l. o. b. cars in the West. Potatoes—Increased offerings cause less active tone. Demand from the West has fallen off but a fair trade is reported on spot, with sales of car lots choice stock 55 to 60c bag. Honey—Dull, white clover in comb 11 to 10 1/2 c; extracted white 8 to 8 1/2 c in ten pound tins; dark buck wheat 6 to 11 1/2 c to quality. Maple Product—No improvement in demand, market dull and prices nominal. Syrup in kegs 51 to 52c, sugar in small casks 8 to 9c and in large barrels 7 1/2 to 8c. Dressed Hogs—Weaker tendency demand fall; sales of fresh killed about 2000, \$7.50 to \$7.75, country dressed \$7.00 to \$7.25 cwt. Hay—Finner feeling but no actual change of prices. Supplies reduced by large lots which the Nova Scotia government is carrying free to that province. Market in a healthy condition and prices still at \$6.50 to \$9.00 ton. Oats—Little activity owing to slow demand from foreign sources. A few car lots of No. 2 white on spot sold at 38 1/2 to 39 1/2 c. No. 3 37 to 37 1/2 c. Feeds—Increased offerings, Ontario grain ruling easier sales of car lots taking place at \$17 to \$18 ton in bulk shorts still scarce, and wanted at \$20 to \$21 per ton. Seals—Quiet and steady; spot prices per cwt. Timothy \$2.50 to \$3.00, red clover \$4.00 to \$4.20, a sack \$9.50 to \$10.00.

ST. JOHN.  
Oct. 22—A great variation in price and conditions of different lines throughout the market, much more so than is usual at this time of year. Market for beef and mutton is extremely dull, eggs very scarce and in good demand. Turkeys exceptionally scarce; butter and eggs of good quality in good demand, while other lines vary about in the same way.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES.  
Apples—Nova Scotia fruit is now arriving freely, and as usual the St. John market is getting its dump of inferior qualities. Prices are so varied that quotations do not seem intelligent. While some stock is selling as low as \$1.00, choice fruit is from \$2.00 to \$2.20. Potatoes—Is very slow and hard to move potatoes for two reasons. One is that the markets that will become scarce a little later, are now fairly well stocked. And another, more important, is that the majority of the crop is in very bad order, and early varieties especially rotting very fast. Prices from \$1.00 to \$1.40 all according to variety. Turnips—Plentiful, 60c to 70c. Onions—Local crop very poor, market varying according to quality and variety, \$3.25 to \$3.75 per barrel.

POULTRY AND EGGS.  
While some lines of poultry are in good supply, others are exceedingly scarce. Chickens—Market fairly well supplied with chickens and fowl at from 40c to 75c. Ducks—scarce, 1 1/2 to \$1.00. Geese—Not in season; price, 50c to 80c. Turkeys—Exceptionally scarce from 14c to 18c. Eggs—Market is very bare of choice fresh eggs, and not a large quantity in sight. There is every prospect of having a much better price and an exceptionally good demand. Choice fresh stock 2 1/2 c; ordinary, 20c to 22c.

DAIRY.  
Butter—Dairy butter is being quite well held in country but not nearly as much as usual, the nearest we can learn. Ordinary tub butter from 17c to 19c; rolls, 17c to 19c; dairy prints, from 17c to 19c; rolls, 17c to 19c; dairy prints, 18c to 20c; creamery, 20c to 2c. Cheese—Most of the cheese stock has been disposed of and prices very firm for late makes. Flats, 10 1/2 to 12c; twins, 10c; large 6 lb. 12c.

MEATS.  
All kinds of meats are extremely dull. Markets very much overstocked and in many cases quality very inferior.

Flour—Still firm at the highest advance, and no prospects as yet of much change. Mill feeds—Continue unchanged at the high prices, and the demand very great.

HALIFAX.  
Oct. 21—Eggs and poultry scarce and in good demand; apple market very dull; vegetable market fair; meats dull. Apples, unchanged; market overstocked with inferior apples; not much demand for them. 1st class No. 1 apples \$1.50 to \$2.00 bbl.  
Beef—Butchers' best grades \$7.50 to \$9.00; country, small light stock, \$4.00 to \$5.00. Butter—unchanged; store-packed large tubs 13 to 16c, dairy prints 20c; creamery, 21 to 22c.  
Bob Skins—50c. Cabbage—45 to 50c doz. Carrots—\$1.00 to \$1.25 doz. Celery—\$1.00 to \$1.25 doz. Chickens—In good demand, 50 to 60c pair. Calf Skins—30c. Ducks—All poultry in good demand; best ducks 75c; fair, poor grades 40 to 50c pair. Eggs—Firm; in good demand, 8 cocks light, N. S., 20c; P. E. I., 10c. Turnips—80 to 90c bbl. Parsnips in good demand; \$1.50 bbl. Hides—6 to 7c. Lamb—9 to 7c. Lamb 5 lines—50 to 75c. Lard—10 to 12c. Mutton—5 to 6c.

Vegetables—Turnips 12c to 16c bushel; carrots, 50c bushel; parsnips, 60c. Tomatoes—15c per qt. Cranberries—85c qt. Hay—per ton, pressed, \$14.00; per cwt 65c to 75c. Straw—Free seed per ton, \$8.00; cut 50c. Oats—37c to 38c.
