CUNARD LINER WITH TRANSPORTS LOST

(Special to the Guardian)

LONDON, Jan. 5.—The liner Ivernia which was reported sunk yesterday was a 14,278 ton steamer which has been for some time in the British Government service as a transport, having at various times carried troops from Canada and between British ports and the Dardanelles. There has been nothing in recent reports regarding her movements. She was built in 1900.

The Ivernia was sunk by an enemy submarine in the Mediterranean on January 1st during bad weather and while carrying troops. At present four military officers and 146 men are missing. Casualties among the Ivernia's officers and crew are not yet definitely known but hopes are entertained that the only officers of the ship missing are the surgeon and chief engineer.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any one over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
