Kirkland Lake Blue Devils Down Montreal Team 6-To Enter Allan Cup Finals

TORONTO, April 14—Pound for pound, and they're not a big team, Kirkland Lake could stand today alongside any former eastern Canadian senior hockey championship squad and not suffer from the comparison. The speedy Blue Devils clinched their right to greatness when they completed their sweep of the finals against Montreal Royals here Saturday.

Kirkland Lake defeated the highly rated Quebec champions 6-4 for their third victory in three games. The victory sent Blue Devils into the Allan Cup finals against the west's best.

Royals set up a two-goal lead in the first period only to see it wiped out within three minutes of the second by a dazzling Blue Devil offensive. It was nip-and-tuck for the remainder of the session which ended 4-4.

For eight minutes of the third the teams sparred with each other. Then Skipper Beane, giant Royal defenceman, tripped Bobby Walton and the Ontario team rushed in another pair of quick goals to settle the issue.

Royals came close to scoring during the remainder of the game but they couldn't beat goalie Jimmy Duran. In a final desperate move, Andy Godkie was pulled from the Montreal net and replaced by a forward.

Dick Kowinak and his pals on the dynamite line—Blink Bellinger and Hal Cooper—sparked the northwesterners. Kowinak scored twice while Bellinger and Cooper each tallied on some

C.A.H.A. Head Favors Jobs For Players

MONTREAL, April 14 (CP)—President of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, declared tonight in an interview that as far as the C. A. H. A. is concerned "the ideal situation and the one we recommend, and the one we intend to work for, is for a player to have a legitimate job, with or without a bonus, for playing hockey."

The declaration by the C. A. H. A. president came after a meeting at which delegates from all parts of Canada, representing the nine branches of the C. A. H. A., expressed their opinion concerning the word "amateur" as contained in the association regulations.

"We feel that there is nothing wrong with hockey players getting salaries or jobs, plus bonuses, or reimbursement in some form or another," said Doctor Hardy.

"The representative of the nine branches that 75 per cent, or more, of the senior hockey players in the Dominion have actually had legitimate jobs. Therefore, the resolutions committee was instructed to go back into meeting tomorrow to recommend whatever changes are necessary to make this clear to the hockey public."

Meanwhile, the resolutions committee discussed a proposal by George Mackintosh of Calgary that teams in the Allan Cup and Memorial Cup playoffs carry only 13 men, instead of 15 as in the 1939-40 season.

Mackintosh, president of the Alberta Amateur Hockey Association, announced today that out of a meeting of the Resolutions Committee, headed by Frank Sargent, second Vice-President of the C. A. H. A., the proposal was turned over for discussion at the general meeting this morning.

Delegates decided to refer it to the Rules Committee.

The proposal by Mackintosh was made in the grounds that many teams find it difficult to operate with a personnel of 15 men, which included the spare goalie.

"The C. A. H. A. resolution teams embarked upon the junior or senior playoffs would be allowed to carry only 12 men and a spare goalie."

Doctor Hardy opened the Association's 26th annual meeting yesterday with the suggestion that "the C. A. H. A. must consider what assistance it can give from the point of view of war, which will be quite apart from any other of its activities."

In his brief opening address, Doctor Hardy stressed that delegates "unambiguously wish for a very definite representation as to what the C. A. H. A. has done as to military hockey."

He suggested that one of the keynotes of the three-day meeting should be "that Canada is at war."

W. A. Hewitt, the Association's Registrar-Treasurer, reported that the C. A. H. A. registrations for the past season throughout Canada totalled 24,952, a decrease of only 1,259. In the record year of 1938-39, the C. A. H. A. had 26,211 players enrolled.

"As a matter of fact," said Hewitt, "there are increased registrations in Alberta, Manitoba and Ontario, but less in the other branches."

The registrar-treasurer reported registrations as follows: Alberta, 1,444; British Columbia, 629; Manitoba, 1,867; Maritimes, 1,499; Ontario (C. A. H. A.), 11,015 and Ontario and District, 2,226; Quebec, 4,567; Saskatchewan, 1,008; Thunder Bay, 730.

Major League Baseball Clubs Hopeful Of Fine Weather For Opening Tilts

NEW YORK, April 14 (AP)—Their wish as to the weather about exhausted from unreasonable training conditions, major league baseball clubs waited hopefully tonight for a breath of spring to bless Tuesday's eight-game opening program.

There was reason to believe they might get it. In contrast to the persistent rains that washed out most of the contests for the first three or four days last year, dry conditions prevailed throughout the east and Midwest and forecasters said warm winds would give temperatures in the big league towns a boost before Tuesday.

If the weather man can be shaken out of his pernicious habits, the inaugural will include these games:

American League: Boston at Washington, New York at Philadelphia, Cleveland at Chicago, St. Louis at Detroit.

National League: Chicago at Cincinnati, Pittsburgh at St. Louis, Brooklyn at Boston, Philadelphia at New York.

These attractions should bring a first-day turnout of more than 150,000 fans, possibly as many as 200,000.

Kenora Thistles Enter Junior Hockey Finals

WINNIPEG, April 14 (CP)—Kenora Thistles overcame a two-goal lead to tie Edmonton Athletic Club 2-2 last night and qualify for the Dominion Junior Hockey final. Thistles will meet Oshawa Generals defending titlists, in a best-of-five series starting in Winnipeg Tuesday.

Kenora entered last night's game with five points to Edmonton's three and the split decision preserved Kenora's two-point margin. The series was based on tie points for a win and one for a tie.

The score of the first game was the same as the fifth, 2-2, and Athletics scored a 7-1 victory in the second match.

The turning point was Wednesday when Thistles, who came from a northwestern Ontario town to win the Manitoba title, halted the Edmonton powerhouse 3-1. What proved to be the winning game came Friday when Thistles outscored Athletics 6-5.

Edmonton piled up a two-goal lead in the first period but Kenora fought back with the equalizers in the second and played "scoreless" hockey for the third stanza and a 10-minute overtime session.

Down Maple Leafs 3-2 In Overtime Play In Sixth Game Of Cup Series

TORONTO, April 14 (CP)—New York Rangers, having done everything that manager Lester Patrick asked and predicted, drank champagne from the Stanley Cup today in the manner of all previous hockey champions of the world.

The Rangers, with one of the most brilliant rallies in the history of the classic, defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 3-2 in overtime last night to capture the best-of-seven cup finals in six games. Patrick, a grey-haired veteran of more than a dozen such series, had said they would do it in six, just as he had forecast accurately that his team would defeat Boston's National League champions in six games in the semi-finals.

Bryan Hextall, the league's leading goal-getter, fired the winning shot after two minutes and seven seconds of extra play on a relay from his teammates on the rough-neck line, Wilf Hiller and Phil Watson.

For a moment the audience of 14,894 customs stunned after seeing their favorites' long lead overcome, sat silent. They stood to cheer a team that had proved its greatness against the Bruins.

For more than two periods a Toronto victory, which would have forced a seventh and deciding game Tuesday, seemed certain. The Leafs scored in the first chapter through Sylvanus Apps and in the second through Nick Metz and missed half a dozen other big opportunities.

Rangers Came to Life Then the Ranger attack came to life. The Maple Leafs' barricades didn't crumble until the Rangers simply shoved their way around, through and over the home team.

With eight minutes of the third period gone, Neil Coville scored from the backhand and was awarded the score kept steadily mounting against them. Try as they could the fast skating Royals were unable to check against the Bruins.

On the other hand the West Royalty boys played in "red" hockey and could not make a mistake.

Both squads gave everything they had and the game from the standpoint of the fans was a fine exhibition throughout. This was likely the last game of the season.

Port Arthur Faces Loss Of Senior Title

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The merrymaking which started in the Rangers' dressing room last night after they came from behind to down the Leafs 3-2 in overtime, continued in a downtown hotel till some of the players and executives boarded a train for Manhattan this morning.

It was the first world hockey title for the Rangers since 1933-33 and in finishing the best-of-seven series in six games Coach Frankie Boucher admitted "we had to go out to beat one of the fighting clubs I've ever seen."

Pandemonium reigned in the Rangers' dressing room as Manager Conn Smythe and members of the Leaf team congratulated the New York players. In their own quarters, the Leafs proved good losers and many of them later joined the Rangers in the dawn-dying whoopee.

Big Red Horner, the National League's perennial bad man but one of the game's finest gentlemen, said the series was "a credit to hockey."

Manager Lester Patrick said "I don't think you'll ever see it duplicated—a father and two sons on the same Stanley Cup team." He placed arms proudly on the shoulders of his two starry sons, Lynn and Murray.
