CANADA'S UNSOLVED MYSTERIES

SHOOTING OF A TAXI-DRIVER

GARSON MINE, Ont., Feb. 12—(CP)—At the side of the Sudbury highway, three miles west of this village, is a tiny, weathered, wooden cross. It marks the spot where the body of Guiseppe Giusti, Sudbury taxi-driver, was found at 9 o'clock on the morning of Nov. 1, 1934, by a passing dairyman. Nine years later the murderer is still at large.

Six bullets from a .32 automatic had riddled the taxi driver's body, five piercing the head, upper arms and shoulders, while one had entered the abdomen. The murdered man's car had been found near Sacred Heart College, Sudbury, 10 miles away, at 10:30 the previous night.

Police investigating the slaying concluded that the murder had been committed about 9 o'clock Saturday night, October 30. The last person to see Giusti alive was his 15-year-old son John, who was at his father's taxi stand at 6 p.m. Saturday night. He was able to give only a meagre description of a "tall man in a dark overcoat," who had come to the stand while he was there, and had arranged for a trip to Garson Mine.

The "tall man in a dark overcoat" bobbed up again when provincial police inquired at a Garson Mine home, where a lengthy wedding celebration was in progress, one answering the description furnished by John Giusti, who had joined in the revelry Saturday night. He had not inquired their names. The other man is believed to have been the Sudbury taxi-driver.

Examination of Giusti's automobile revealed no bloodstains, indicating that he had been slain outside the machine, and that his body had not been transported in it.

Motive for the murder remained a mystery. Giusti's pockets were stripped of everything except a bunch of keys, but if the motive was robbery it is difficult to understand why the slayer should have ridden around with his victim for several hours. The morning he was slain Giusti had deposited \$405 in the bank.

Sun Life Assurance Company Shows Big Increase

MONTREAL, Feb. 12—A forty-one million dollar increase in assets; now paid for business of over two hundred and thirty-six million dollars, an increase of approximately twenty million dollars over 1933; cash in banks approximately twenty million dollars; and an excess income over all disbursements of more than forty-three million dollars are four of the outstanding features of the Sixty-Fourth Annual Report of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada covering operations during 1934, presented to the shareholders and shareholders by Arthur B. Wood, President and Managing Director, at the Annual Meeting held here to-day.

The financial statement, which incidentally is the first presented by Mr. Wood since he assumed the Presidency of the company a year ago, is marked by a decided conservative note and indicates improvement in economic conditions and increased business activity in the United States, Great Britain and Canada, the three countries in which the Sun Life operates. The figures are especially encouraging to those who are seeking evidence of improvement in industry and show the ability of the public to purchase insurance and also of their growing appreciation of the record which the company has made during the last few years.

Perhaps one of the most interesting features of the report from the public standpoint, for it directs attention in a rather forceful manner to a definite recovery is taking place in the group life insurance and industrial plant employees in Canada and Great Britain, a clear indication of the return to paravols of the workers. New group life business almost doubled, and in addition the amount of group life business in force by about twenty-five million dollars. The experience of the Sun Life in regard to group life is the experience of the leading companies of this continent where over ten billion dollars on group life is in force and it is estimated that twenty-five percent of the families of the continent are protected by

this type of policy. The reduction in the number of loans applied for and the repayment of loans made in preceding years would indicate that many people improved their financial status in 1934. Cash repayments were thirty-one percent greater than 1933 while there was a substantial reduction in new loans.

Total income for the year was over one hundred and fifty-nine million dollars with over two hundred and thirty-six million dollars of new paid for business for the year 1934. Since 1929 business in force of the Sun Life has increased by two hundred and eighty million dollars and now stands at two billion seven hundred and forty-eight million dollars, the Sun Life maintaining its position as one of the ranking companies of the world.

The assets now stand at six hundred and sixty-five million dollars for the year. During the year the bond account increased by over forty-six million dollars, while cash in banks is over nineteen and a half million dollars and loans on company's policies show a decided decrease. A profit of approximately one and three-quarters million dollars was realized by the sale of securities. Apart from these items there has been very little change in company's investment portfolio.

In the five year depression period the Sun Life's assets increased by over ninety-seven million dollars while during that time payment to policy holders totalled over four hundred and sixty-eight million dollars or more than three hundred and twelve thousand dollars for every working day. Payments to policyholders during 1934 were over eighty-eight million dollars, bringing the total paid since organization to over eight hundred and eighty-eight million dollars.

The Director's report shows that continued efforts toward economies have resulted in further reduction in the cost of management and administration. The total expenses being a million dollars less than the corresponding figure for 1933; while the surplus earned during the year amounted to \$31,281,236.11, of which \$13,219,504.28 has been paid or allotted in dividends to holders of participating policies. The sum of \$9,022,964.45 has been applied to writing down securities and increasing of reserves.

Mr. Wood, in presenting the report, reviewed at some length the company's operations during 1934

remarkably that the statement, in view of present day conditions, he felt was encouraging and satisfactory. Mr. Wood is of the opinion, based on reports from the important countries where the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada operates, that the world is gradually emerging from the depression although he believes that a great deal has yet to be done before the world could hope to return to the level of prosperity which the progress of science and invention have made possible.
