MAYBE CRYSTALS IN CANNED FISH

OTTAWA, June 25—(CP)—If some day on opening a can of lobster, salmon, chicken, haddock, shrimp or crab, you note a number of white crystals, do not be alarmed, says the Fisheries News Bulletin. These shiny white particles are not necessarily glass or any other dangerous substance but in all probability are crystals of magnesium ammonium phosphate. Under certain circumstances, according to the scientists of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, these crystals occasionally form from the natural ingredients of fish flesh.

RADIO HOMES IN CANADA SURVEYED BY COUNTIES

Elliott-Haynes Limited, Toronto, research organization has issued "A Study of Radio Homes in Canada," a 40-page mimeographed report, in bound form. Senator Claims 100,000 Homes To Take Refugees

OTTAWA, June 25—(CP)—Senator Ivor Ballis (Con. Ontario) today tabled a resolution in the House of Commons to study the methods adopted by Germany in taking in and caring for 100,000 refugees and to consider how they are equipped and clothed and what their objectives are.

Japs Fasten Hold On French Indo - China

TOKYO, June 26—(Wednesday)—(AP)—Japan fastened a military and naval grip on French Indo-China. A cryptic announcement disclosed that Japanese troops, nine days ago, acted "by force" to cut the supply route from Indo-China to the Central Chinese government at Chungking.

British Take Over French War Orders

NEW YORK, June 25—(CP)—Arthur Purvis, director general of the British purchasing commission, tonight announced that on June 17, 1940, all existing contracts for war materials entered into by the French government with United States suppliers, were assigned to the British government.

U. S. Shoulders Heaviest Tax Load Since '18

WASHINGTON, June 25—(AP)—The United States today shouldered its heaviest federal tax load since the first great war. President Roosevelt's signature made law of a bill estimated to raise an additional \$4,692,500,000 in the next five years by adding 2,200,000 citizens to the list of income tax payers and by raising the rates on income, profits, excise, gift and inheritance taxes. The money will be used to help finance the defence program authorized by Congress.

Court Rules On Defence Act Appeal Case

TORONTO, June 25—(CP)—Ontario Court of Appeal today upheld the sentence recently imposed at Ottawa against Harry Binder, for breaches of Defence of Canada Regulations but quashed similar convictions against two others who were tried at the same time.

Arthur Roy Saunders, and Arthur Binder, his brother Louis, and a Court jury of having published and circulated anti-war pamphlets, Harry Binder, former Ottawa press editor, former Ontario representative of the Daily Clarion, a Communist paper not now publishing, was sentenced to three years and fined \$2,000 or an additional year. The other two were sentenced to two and a half years each with fines of \$1,000 or additional terms of six months in the Royal Canadian Mounted, and Saunders was a Dominion civil servant.
