Altogether a very pleasant evening was spent, and much credit is due Miss MacDonald and Miss MacGuigan, teachers, who assisted the pupils in training for their several parts.

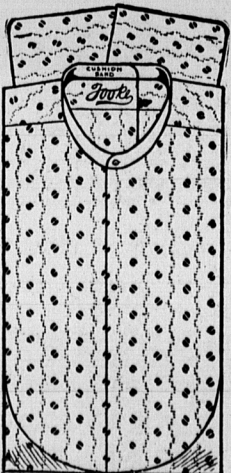
