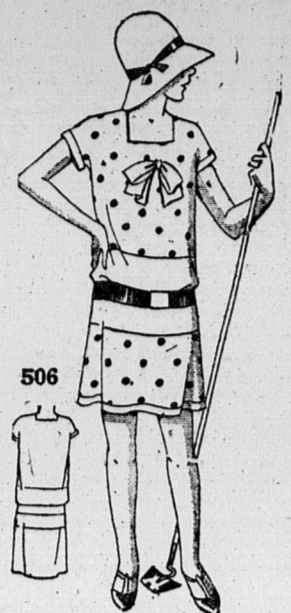

BEAUTY QUESTIONS ANSWERED

Darkening Lashes and Eyebrows
Dear Miss Leeds—(1) Do you know of a harmless preparation for making light eyelashes and brows darker? (2) I am 25 years old. Can a receding chin be remedied?

A READER
Answer—You may use a good brand of mascara for this purpose. Remove it thoroughly at bedtime with the aid of cold cream. After cleansing your face at night apply white vaseline to the small hairs, letting it remain overnight; this will gradually darken the hairs to some extent. It is best not to use a dye on the lashes for fear of irritating the eyes, but strong black tea may be used. (2) It is possible to develop the muscle on the ball of the chin by massage and constant exercise. LOIS LEEDS.

Too Much Steaming

Dear Miss Leeds—About two months ago while steaming my face with hot towels I seem to have scalded my skin. At times, since then, it gets reddish looking. What shall I do about it? I have black hair and blue eyes. What colors are becoming?

Answer—The reddish appearance may be due to blood vessels that became dilated with the excessive heat. I think the condition will pass away in time. In the meanwhile avoid using hot water on your face; use tepid water to wash and follow with an ice rub. Avoid stimulating beverages like tea and coffee and also condiments and highly spiced foods. Eat fresh fruits and green vegetables, drink plenty of water between meals; avoid constipation. If the condition does not show signs of clearing up by summer time consult a physician, as it may develop into acne rosacea. If your skin is fair you may wear dark and medium blues and greens, warm tan, brown, beige, bright red, rust, pastel pinks, old rose, bright yellow, orange, the popular yellowish greens and sun-tan shades, cream-white, gray, blue-violet. Scars From Pimples

Dear Miss Leeds—I had pimples on my face but now they are going away and they are leaving indentations. I am a boy 18 years old and am afraid that I shall be marked for life.

Answer—The best thing you can do is to consult a skin specialist about the scars. Ordinarily, holes left by pimples will heal completely in time, but if yours seems unusually deep they may require electrical or other treatments. I cannot tell without an examination. Slowness in healing is frequently due to lack of general physical fitness. Be sure that you are the right weight for age and height. Keep your digestive tract in order. Exercise outdoors daily. A little healing salve rubbed on the scars may help. LOIS LEEDS.

Betty—The average weight for your age and height is 125 pounds. A good way to develop a normal bust is to take up swimming. Arm flinging exercises are good. Build up your weight. Cracked Crockery

If a cracked piece of crockery is boiled in sweet milk, it will be restored to use.

Stove Polish

Moisten the stove polish with a little vinegar, instead of water, and it will give twice the luster with much less effort.

Ice Cream

A recipe for plain ice cream is one gallon of milk, 1/2 pint of sweet cream, 7 eggs, 4 cups of sugar, and flavor to taste. Stir together; then freeze.

COOKIES WHEN YOU LACK ROLLING PIN

The modern mistress of the kitchen isn't going to spend the time keeping the cookie jar filled that her grandmother did. Nevertheless the cookies may be quite as good—or perhaps better—considering all the good things she has to make things with in these days.

Fortunately cookies can be made without benefit of rolling pin by dropping the dough from a spoon, or by forming it into rolls, chilling and slicing it, or by spreading batter over the pans and cutting it after it is baked. These three methods make it possible to bake quite a large batch of delicious cookies in a half hour, or even less.

JELLY DELIGHTS

Beat 1 egg and 1 cup of sugar together until light. Flavor with vanilla lemon or almond. Gradually add 2 1/2 cups sifted pastry flour. Then knead in 1-4 pound of cold shortening until the dough is well blended. Form into rolls or "sausages" about two inches in diameter, and set in the ice-box for several hours. Then slice with a sharp knife in thin slices and bake on greased pans in a moderate oven until a light brown. Just before serving, spread the undersides with jelly, and put two and two together.

ICEBOX COOKIES

One and one-half cups shortening, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 cup granulated sugar, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 4 1-2 cups flour, 1 1-2 teaspoons soda, 1 cup nut meats.

Cream the shortening thoroughly, add the sugars gradually, then the beaten eggs. Mix well. Then add the dry ingredients which have been sifted three times and mixed with the nut meats. Pack in a mold or form into a roll about the size of a rolling pin, wrap in wax paper, and leave in the refrigerator overnight. With a sharp knife, slice as thin as possible, lay on an oiled cookie sheet, and bake for twelve to fifteen minutes in a moderate oven until a golden brown. The dough of these cookies may be kept on hand in a cold place, and when needed may be quickly cut and baked.
