PICNIC GREAT SUCCESS—The Scotchfort Memorial Society picnic, held yesterday at Scotchfort, was voted the most successful ever held by the Society. During the afternoon an eloquent and inspiring address appropriate to the occasion, was delivered by Professor Angus L. Macdonald, of Dalhousie University, also by Rev. J. J. MacDonald, Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan and others. An excellent catering service with well laid tables maintained by the ladies of Charlottetown, added greatly to the success of the picnic. The ideal weather brought out about two thousand people.

RACE OF SUPER-MEN

LONDON, July 24—(British United Press)—Men like giants, dogs as big as donkeys, rats as big as cats and hens that lay eggs large enough to supply a meal for a whole family.

This is the vision of a Leeds inventor and scientist who claims to be on the verge of discovering a "food of the gods" that will produce giants of stature and brain. He is Roger Birtwhistle, a man of private means who retired many years ago from a public post in Australia in order to devote his entire energies to research work.

After years of patient experimenting and investigation in quest of an elixir that would make men and animals grow more quickly, he has just announced that this dream is near realization, following co-operation with an American professor. "I have discovered a mixture," he states, "with which I have made a number of partly successful experiments on rats. A week ago six rats were injected with the mixture. Two died immediately. The other four lived three days, during which time they increased their size by over three inches."

**Dominion Offers Many Opportunities To Scottish Folk**

Canada has much to offer the Scottish emigrant of the domestic or business class in the opinion of two social workers from Aberdeen, Miss Bella Walker and Miss Moffatt, who were luncheon guests at the Canadian Business and Professional Women's Club yesterday. Miss Walker and Miss Moffatt are en route for home after a trans-Canada trip, taken with a view to determining what Canada had to offer her immigrants from the Land of the Heather. In their addresses at luncheon yesterday, they stated that what they had seen and heard in the last few weeks had given them a message to take back with them entirely different from what they had anticipated.

Convinced of the golden opportunities that await immigrants to the Dominion, they declared that they would go home carrying with them the message that they must send out to Canada the best. Miss Walker's remarks dealt chiefly with the club movement. She showed what a real

need had been filled in Aberdeen by the organization of a Business Women's Club, a club whose membership is 720 after its three years of existence, whose fees are ten shillings a year, and whose members are drawn from the business world only excluding both industries and professions, but including the youngest apprentice or errand girl in business life.

The membership fee, she stated, was augmented by voluntarily raised sums, ranging from five shillings to fifty pounds, the result of individual effort. The enormous sum of £1,600 was collected in this way, and a building financed with the assistance of the Y. W. C. A., which loaned money at 2 per cent. in so worthy a cause. The result was a substantial building, bought, as Miss Walker said, Scottish fashion, when the building market was at a low ebb, and equipped with lounge, cafeteria, library and four bedrooms, each with two beds, for the convenience of visiting business women.

A council of 130 women drawn from different lines of business, decided the policy of the club, Miss Walker explained, but the entire membership is responsible for carrying it out, "which probably accounts for the remarkable enthusiasm displayed." Another factor, said Miss Walker, is the lack of patronage, which is so often tendered by women who are interested without being actively engaged in business. "This was definitely excluded from the program," she stated, "and it appears to be working out splendidly."

LONDON, July 24—(British United Press)—A man of 60 with a long white beard; a young school girl aged 11; a 40-year-old woman with a family of eight; a man with one leg. And they all want to the swim the English Channel!

If ambitions count for anything this is going to be a record year for the disciples of Captain Webb. Over 20 people so far have announced their intention of swimming the Channel. In fact, Channel swimming is going to be the popular sport of the season.

The oldest aspirant for honors is R. C. Buckmaster, of Camden Town, who is 60 years of age. The youngest is Miss Joan Branton, of Dover, who is 11. Among the other entrants are Miss Ivy Hawke, Miss Liddle Sharp, Edward 11, Tenme, Norman Derham, Helmi, Toth, and Michel, the majority of whom have already accomplished the feat.

It is also stated that Miss Mercedes Glettez and Dr. Dorothy Logan may be among the competitors.

LONDON, July 24—In Parliament yesterday afternoon, Sir Charles Trevelyan, president of the Board of Education, announced his decision to prepare legislation which would raise the age at which children may leave school, from 14 to 15 years in 1931.

In the meantime the Minister is seeking the co-operation of local education authorities and professional bodies, and consideration is being given to the form and amounts of children maintenance allowances.

The increase of the school-leaving age is part of the general programme to relieve unemployment. It is estimated this would relieve the labor market of hundreds of thousands of youngsters, when put into effect.
