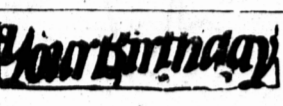
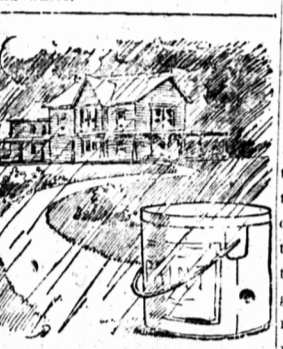

**THE LATE KING GOVERNMENT.**  
"All is over now, the hope and the fear and the sorrow," all the bartering and bargaining; all the amending and sub-amending to resolutions any one of which threatened, and finally took, the life of the King Government.

An old Latin proverb enjoins upon us to "speak no ill of the dead." Notwithstanding this injunction we have no hesitation in stating that the demise of the King Government will cause no sorrow except among those who had selfishly profited and who still hope to selfishly profit by it—and their name, to our shame, has been greater than it ought to be.

Just what the next step will be it would be useless to predict. In any event there will be an election and on that election the future of Canada for many years, perhaps for all time, depends.

Canada has had her lesson, and she paid dearly for it. That such another Government as that which went out in disgrace yesterday morning shall ever again hold office in Canada is unthinkable. But this depends largely upon the view that shall be taken by the people of Canada. Those who were parties to the shuffling, the trickery that kept the King Government in galvanized life for the past six months should now retire into private life and, at their head, Mr. Mackenzie King and those who contributed their share to the disgraceful proceedings. This, of course, will depend upon the election.

If the lesson has been learned aright, if the need of real men rather than automatons in parliament has been learned, the electors will make their selection accordingly. Those who once broke faith with their electors, who openly defended their own and the Government's actions, may be expected to do so again if they get the chance.

Now that the road has been cleared there is a chance for the country, a chance for that progress and prosperity which our great natural resources entitle us to. Let there be a new beginning and a new era. Our despatches this morning are full of interest. The last hectic hours were spectacular.

**Notes by the Way**

The semi-centennial of the telephone was recently celebrated. That from a small beginning with much doubt in the public mind as to its general utility it has in fifty years overspread the world is now a matter of common knowledge. The difficulties encountered in its introduction into the cities are brought into notice by an incident recorded in the Saint John Globe. Two weeks of hard canvassing in that city only resulted in one subscriber being secured. As there seemed to be no prospect of getting another, the promoters had to go back to their one subscriber and tell him they must cancel his contract, as there was no one for him to talk to!

Like difficulties were met with in other cities, American and Canadian, with the result that for the time little progress was made in the introduction of this great modern appliance. That dilatory stage was, however, of short duration as the great business value and social importance of the telephone came to be realized. In a few short years it has become almost a household necessity and one of man's greatest triumphs in his career of progress. It was 300 years ago that Milton wrote the memorable line, "Peace hath her victories not less renowned than those of war." And there have been countless victories of peace since Milton's day, of which his rich imagination had no conception.

**HISTORIC VISIT.**  
Since the lamented death of the Honorable Edward Whelan, one of the most distinguished public men in the history of the Province, efforts have been made to fittingly commemorate his labors by the erection of a suitable monument. Some funds have already been contributed for this purpose and are available. In an effort to revise this worthy object a movement is now on foot and Professor D. C. Harvey, M.A., Oxford, now Professor of History in the University of Manitoba, has been induced to come to the Province early in August to address a number of meetings. Professor Harvey has made a special study of this subject and is at present in Ottawa, searching records in the Archives for material both for his addresses and a history of Prince Edward Island, the first volume of which is already in print and the second in course of completion. In connection with this latter volume Professor Harvey is exceedingly anxious to meet, while here, persons who can give him any information, not yet written, regarding the early history, political, social and traditional of the Island.

The place and date of Professor Harvey's lecture on Whelan are now being arranged and announcements will be duly made. It will be of valuable service to the people of Prince Edward Island of all classes to hear such an authority as Professor Harvey on the early events of the political history of this Province, and the part taken therein by Mr. Whelan and his contemporaries. There are few chapters in the history of Canada that are more stirring and interesting than the history of the years during which Responsible Government, the Land Question and Confederation were woven into the web that has evolved into the conditions of the present day.

**NOT PARTY-TIED**  
It is gratifying to note by the proceedings in the House of Commons that of the few Progressives who refused to take part in the whitewashing of the King Government, one was a native of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Milton N. Campbell, M.P. for Mackenzie, Saskatchewan, a Progressive, speaking on one of the amendments to the Stevens report on the Customs revelations, declared it had "revealed one of the worst moral and political scandals that had ever besmirched the fair name of Canada" and he was going to support Stevens' amendment. He was interrupted by Mr. Forke, leader of the Progressives, who told him to speak for himself, not for the Progressive group.

Mr. Campbell retorted that Mr. Forke had never been able to speak for the Progressive group and was not speaking for it today, adding that the only purpose of the Woodsworth sub-amendment was "to whitewash the whole filthy proceedings."

It was a scathing rebuke from one of his own followers, and the effect on the group no doubt had something to do with the denouement of Monday morning when the King Government went into oblivion.

**What victories have been wrought over disease and in the prevention and amelioration of human suffering even within a century past. Plague and cholera banished from the world, surgery rendered painless, hospitals for the insane and the sick and orphanages for bereaved children—these are but a few of the many victories of peace which have blessed the world even within the lifetime of the centenarians still living and which give hope for humanity in the future.**

**The King Government, unable to carry its measures dissolved Parliament in October last and appealed to the people. The people slaughtered nine of its eighteen ministers and sent back to Ottawa a shattered and humiliated remnant, defeated and disgraced. Since then have come the devastating revelations of the Probe Committee which have amazed the country. Throughout the past six months' struggle the Government has been able to cling to office by a purchased majority of reduced to one or two.**

**Now in its dying struggle it appoints another Senator and two Civil Service Commissioners—afraid to wait the vote now pending, which may sweep them from office. . . . The new Senator will take his seat beside Bureau, ex-Minister of Customs, who had been thus rewarded for having "debauched his Department." So things have gone from bad to worse and the end is not yet reached. But surely the end must be near.**

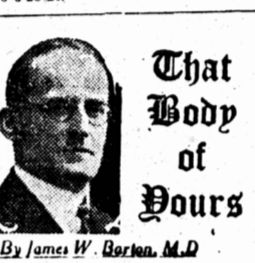
**Success of the King's College Appeal Vital to the Future of Higher Education in the Maritime Provinces**

**That Body of Hours**

**MIGRAINE WITHOUT HEADACHE**

Some time ago I spoke about two Chicago physicians who had found twenty cases suffering with severe attacks of nausea and vomiting, occurring at regular intervals.

These physicians felt that the attacks were exactly like what is called migraine, except that there was no headache.

Now migraine, as you remember, is a kind of sick headache occurring at intervals of a few days or a few weeks, and affecting one side only, near the eye or temple, often accompanied by nausea and vomiting.

These physicians now report ten more of these cases. Some of them give a history of having had the regular type of migraine, that is with the headache for several years, but now found that while the headache was absent, all the other abdominal symptoms were present, and the attacks came on at regular intervals as usual.

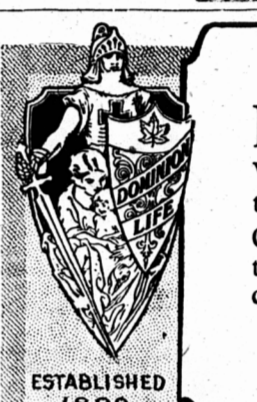
In some of the cases the attacks so greatly resembled gall stone colic that an exploratory opening had been made in the abdomen, only to find the gall bladder free of trouble.

In others an ulcer of the stomach was suspected, and although test meals and X ray examination showed nothing, it was thought advisable to make an exploratory opening anyway, and the stomach was found to be in a normal condition.

There was a family history of migraine in nearly every case. The attacks usually began abruptly, lasted one to four days, and ended just as abruptly.

And the cause? No one has been able to locate the cause as yet. Some investigators claim that it is simply a gradual poisoning from the intestine, a sort of a slow acting constipation that reaches a climax, and gives these "severe bilious" attacks. Others think it is nervous exhaustion.

Our two Chicago physicians however, believe that it is a nervous condition, their statement being "It would seem that under certain conditions parts of the brain have a tendency (inherited), to become a storm centre, which involves the large nerve supplying the organs of the abdomen and thus nausea and vomiting ensue."
