THE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

The public library is coming! The late Mr. Dodd's handsome donation to the Y M C A prepared the way. Dr. Clift came in promptly and generously. Read Mr. Lordly's letter in another column of today's GUARDIAN which speaks nobly for itself and for him. And then we are able also to record the public spirited offers of valuable books from Hon. B. Rogers and Superintendent McLeod and of \$100 from Premier Farquharson, conditional upon nine others being found to contribute a like sum each. What seems now to be needed is for the Y M C A executive to act promptly, organize the library and put it in operation while so many citizens are in the donating mood. There is a tide in the affairs of public libraries, as in the affairs of men, which ought to be taken at the flood.

SIR WILFRID SAYS NO.

We greatly regret to record the answer given, or reported to have been given, by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to a delegation of the Dominion Alliance yesterday. It implies that the government will refuse to act upon the verdict given by the Canadian people at the plebiscite on 29th September. Such a refusal will bar the door to all hope of securing a federal prohibitory law during the term of the present parliament.

The decision will be a sad disappointment to the friends of prohibition generally and especially to many thousands of friends and supporters of the government throughout English-speaking Canada. It will subject the party fealty of the latter to a severe test, and can hardly fail to weaken the Liberal party in the country at large. The hopes of the prohibitionists, raised by Sir Wilfrid's promise that the wishes of the people would be respected, are suddenly dashed to the ground.

Of course, if such is the final decision of the government it may be best to make it known frankly and at once. It is now apparent that the Liberal press have been all along preparing the public mind for the government's refusal to act upon the result of the plebiscite.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The new arrangement of the mails gives pretty general satisfaction, as the post office clerks hustle the mails east and west after they arrive by the Princess in the early morning. Papers and letters from St John continue to come by the western route as before.

Among her provisions for making good the cost of her last disastrous war Spain has issued a mourning stamp of the value of one cent to be affixed to every letter carried through the inland mails of the kingdom and its colonies. The stamp is of the ordinary size and is printed in sombre black.

Premier Hardy has now not only secured the election of his two colleagues, Hon. Messrs. Gibson and Dryden, but has gained a seat in the process and so has added two to his former majority in the house. South Ontario, where Mr. Dryden was elected the other day, is usually a Liberal riding but went Conservative last spring and has now returned to its first love.

The Toronto Globe publishes the names of the seventeen men who were found guilty of corrupt practices in South Ontario election and who are now under sentence disfranchising them from voting or holding office for eight years to come. The lesson is a wholesome one and ought to be repeated in the case of every man who attempts to bribe a voter. If an honest and energetic attempt were made by law-abiding citizens throughout the Dominion to enforce the law against the bribers the disreputable offence would be reduced to a fraction of its present proportions.

The law against selling "scalp" railway tickets is a very real thing, although the fear of the penalty is not always before the eyes of men. The other day at Regina one A. O. Hitchcock was arraigned before a magistrate, charged with selling the return part of a cheap excursion ticket for a long distance for \$18. The man to whom the ticket had been sold was taken off the train at Regina and Hitchcock was made to refund the money to him, and also pay a fine of \$30 and costs or go to jail for 60 days. The full penalty for selling or buying a "scalp" ticket is \$50 or imprisonment. Prudent, law-abiding people will always buy their railway tickets of the regular ticket agent of the road by which they intend to travel.

"It is pointed out," says the St. John Sun, "that a small percentage of the electors voted for prohibition. But a still smaller percentage voted the other way. For that matter, if we are to speak of percentages, it could be shown that not more than 32 per cent of the votes on the electors list in 1896 was cast for the party led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Yet that party claims a mandate to govern this country."

The 21st Lancers, who so greatly distinguished themselves in the battle before Omdurman a few weeks ago, are about to be returned to England, and the mayor of Toronto, in a letter to Lord Aberdeen, has expressed the wish of many Canadians that they shall take the Canadian route on the way. The Lancers would get a right royal reception in the Dominion should the request be granted. Canadians would delight to do them honor. It is not yet known whether they will come this way, as the route from Cairo via Canada to England would be a very long one.

It is interesting to note that while in Canada our wheelmen are required to pay for the carriage of their wheels on the government railways, there are 135 United States railways that carry bicycles free as baggage. Most of these railways do this voluntarily and others because of compulsory decisions of the courts. The president of the Long Island railway is quoted as saying that he regards the wheelmen as among the most profitable patrons of the road. They have, as a rule, very little luggage and it is more reasonable to carry a twenty-five pound wheel free as baggage than to carry Saratoga trunks and theatrical scenery as is done on all American railways.

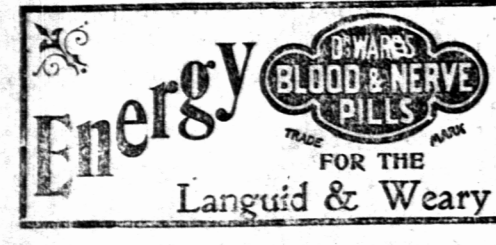
