Mark Twain's "Tom Sawyer" At Prince Edward

Via the genius of David O. Selznick and his magic of technicolor, Mark Twain's famous characters stepped from the pages of his immortal story and on to the screen of the Prince Edward Theatre last night, where Mr. Selznick's inspired technicolor production, "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer," had its first showing. Tom Sawyer, Huckleberry Finn, Joe Harper, Becky Thatcher, Aunt Polly, Injun Joe, Muff Potter and all the rest came to vivid life again in the little Missouri town along the Mississippi, which is where Tom and his friends achieved immortality. It is a triumph of marvelous entertainment and one of the finest things that has ever been done. In black and white it would be a great picture, in technicolor it is a masterpiece. The subject is one that lends itself to color and some of the shots are breathtakingly magnificent, especially those where Tom and Becky are lost in the cave. It is said to be the first time a cavern with its stalactites and stalagmites has been shown in natural color. Moreover, the pictorial effects of the quaint settings of the small town and the background of the Mississippi against which the colorful and interesting characters play out their drama, are all heightened by the use of color. The cast is an impressive one and includes May Robson, who gives one of her finest performances as Aunt Polly; Jackie Moran in the ragged Huckleberry Finn; Becky Thatcher,

red hair, blue eyes, freckles and all, is played by Ann Gillis; Walter Brennan is the town delinquent, Muff Potter; Victor Jory mutes a sinister and menacing Injun Joe; Cora Sue Collins is convincing as Amy Lawrence and David Holt is excellent as Tom's brother, Sid Sawyer. In the school scene presided over by Donald Meek as the severe schoolmaster, a host of fifty or more juvenile extras are seen.

Laurel and Hardy reach a new peak of comedy in an Alpine setting, climbing to dizzy heights of mirth in "Swiss Miss," their new musical film which opened yesterday at the Capitol Theatre. Their new picture has been given a highly entertaining plot and a sumptuous production. Settings are of unusual beauty and some of the scenes in and about the village inn where most of the action takes place rank high in pictorial quality. Singers, dancers and musicians, garbed in the quaint costumes of the region, give a glamorous impression of a Swiss fete.
