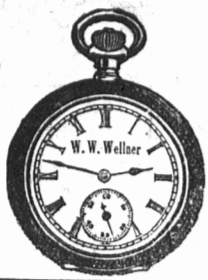

P. E. ISLAND OYSTERS.

The annual meeting of the marine biological board, presided over by Professor Prince, was held in the office of the Dominion commissioner of fisheries on Saturday. The board consists of delegates from each of the great universities of Canada, as follows: Professor E. E. Prince, commissioner of fisheries, director; Professor H. Ramsay Wright, University of Toronto, assistant director; Professor D. P. Fenhallow, McGill University, Montreal, secretary; Professor L. W. Bailey, University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, N. B.; Rev. Abbe V. A. Huard, of Laval University, Chicoutimi, P. Q.; Professor A. P. Knight, Queen's University, Kingston, Ont.; Professor A. B. Macalain, University of Toronto; Professor E. W. MacBride, McGill University, Montreal; Dr. A. H. MacKay, of Dalhousie University, Halifax, N. S.

The matters which were chiefly discussed, in addition to the financial arrangements for the year, were the work of the biological station at Malpeque, P. E. Island, and a scheme for the improvement of the deep sea fisheries in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The assistant-director, Professor Wright, reported that very valuable observations on the causes of deterioration in the oyster beds of Prince Edward Island had been made, and a new system of fattening the oysters on lays and on bouliots was being tried which it is anticipated will materially increase the size and quality of the shell fish. On account of the large amount of business to be dealt with by the board preparatory to the coming season's work the meeting adjourned until March 26th.—Ottawa Citizen.
