Miss Daisy Grady, Summerside, was the victim of a cowardly attack by a person, at present unknown, on Wednesday evening last. Miss Grady states that she was alone, serving in the store owned by Mrs. George P. Grady, Water Street, Summerside, when a man, a stranger to her, entered about 8.30 and asked for a soft drink. She served the customer, who passed some remarks about general matters. She noticed the man had a hammer in his hand. When he had finished his drink, he offered her a quarter, and, as she was giving him his change, the stranger struck at her with the hammer. Miss Grady received its full force on the hand, which she had raised to ward off the blow. Fortunately a German Police dog, owned by the Grady family, came from behind the shop, and the stranger beat a precipitate retreat. Miss Grady fainted, and, on recovering, called some of the neighbors, who informed the police.

Mrs. Grady and Miss Rose Grady had gone to the picture show some time before the incident occurred, leaving Miss Daisy Grady in charge of the shop.

While the intruder was unknown to her, Miss Grady states she has a clear idea of the man's features and could identify him. She described him as of slight build, pale complexion and wearing a dark blue suit. Not in vigorous health, she is suffering from the shock of the unexpected attack.

The police are making a thorough investigation of the matter.

## Canadian Airways Alter Schedule

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, July 7—Canadian Airways, Limited, which has been operating a passenger service between Montreal, N. B., and Charlottetown, P. E. I., has decided to alter the schedule of departures in order to assist their clients in making better train connections. The plane flown on this route will spend the night at Charlottetown in future, instead of at Moncton, taking its departure at 1 p.m. (A.S.T.) and arriving in Moncton an hour later. Passengers taking this method of crossing the Northumberland Strait will be enabled to make a close connection with the Ocean Limited, leaving for Montreal at 2.35 p.m., and arriving here the following morning. The company's officials explained that passengers crossing by the ferry to catch that train had to leave Charlottetown at an early hour in the morning.

The return flight was also considered beneficial, as the Ocean Limited from Montreal arrived in Moncton at 3.25 p.m., and passengers desirous of flying across to Prince Edward Island left the airport at 4 p.m., reaching their destination at 5 o'clock instead of after ten o'clock at night.

Similar connections will be made with trains departing or arriving for or from Halifax, Saint John and Boston.

Walter Fowler, who is in charge of the company's flying school at Moncton, would remain in charge of the southern terminus, while Ronald George would do most of the flying and be in charge of the northern terminus of the line.

While the experts were putting the finishing touches on the details and mechanism of the treaty and annexes Premier Herriot demanded to see a complete draft before he entered into the question of figures.

The Germans blamed French "intractability" for disappointing the German hope of treating the reparations question in the wider framework of European reconstruction, for halting the German road towards restoration of mutual confidence by removal of discriminating clauses of the peace treaty. "It is therefore necessary," said the Germans semi-officially, "to find a solution on the narrow basis of reparations only."

One of the political demands the Germans have been making during the crucial negotiations included today a long conference between Premier Herriot and Chancellor Von Papen, was that what is known in Germany as the "war gull" clause of the Versailles treaty should be eliminated. Although there had been several reports that this German demand had been met by insertion of a phrase in the draft treaty it was made quite clear tonight that Premier Herriot had refused to accept it.

Marine experts offered hope tonight that the men inside the submarine might have found time to close the watertight hatches before there was a fatal rush of the seas into the ship, which sank like a flash.

They added that, if no serious break occurred in the hull, it was reasonable to expect that the crew ran no immediate danger of death. This hope, however, was coupled with a pessimistic statement that salvaging conditions were difficult, first because of the powerful currents and second because of the depth of the sea.

Arrangements were pressed in the endeavor to raise the submarine. They were aided by the presence at Cherbourg of France's special floating dock for the raising of submarines. Efforts tonight were concentrated on determining the exact location of the ship and the conformation of the sea bed.

The crew of a fishing craft flying near the scene of the disaster proudly watching the submarine this afternoon were shocked to see it suddenly stagger and disappear. A number of men standing on the deck seemed to be flung into the sea. The fishing ship sailed for the scene and rescued the seven from the sea, including the commander, Lieutenant Du Mesnil.

It was believed that others of the crew were on deck at the time, but were dragged down by the suction of the terrific current, which might have caused the submarine's sinking. Search continued throughout the night for other possible survivors.

## NOVA SCOTIA COAL For Ontario

BROOKVILLE, Ont., July 7.—The Collier Coalfax reacher here today with a cargo of 1,000 tons of Nova Scotian bituminous coal, which will be consumed next winter at the Ontario Hospital. The consignment is the first bulk shipment of Canadian coal to reach here by water and represents part of an order given by the Ontario government for use in provincial hospitals.

The marine police of Cherbourg sent out all the vessels at their disposal. Tugboats, despatch boats and aeroplanes patrolled the scene of the disaster watching for reappearance of the submarine.

It was the first major disaster of a French submarine since 1928 when the Ondine went down in collision with a Greek steamer off Portugal. Forty-three men perished in that accident.

The sea off Cherbourg was the scene of an earlier disaster when the submarine Vendemiaire sank with the loss of 22 lives off the Headlands near on June 8, 1912. The Vendemiaire, participating in manoeuvres, rose under the bows of the battleship St. Louis, was struck squarely and sank instantly. The Promethee's crew numbered 49, including two officers and 10 petty officers. The two officers and two of the petty officers were among the seven saved.

The Promethee was built for a normal crew of 65. Like her sister submarines, the Redoutable and the Vengeur, she was designed for 30-day cruises to distant French colonies.

On today's trip the vessel carried in addition to the normal complement one marine engineer, two technicians, seven workers from the local arsenal, two experts and five workmen from the Schneider arms firm.

The Ministry of Marine said the Promethee was making a trial trip on the surface when suddenly she sank in a depth of about 25 fathoms, seven miles north of Cap Levé. It said it did not believe the accident was due either to collision with another ship or to floating wreckage.

The cause of the accident was still a mystery tonight.

Lieutenant Du Mesnil, hearing a noise on deck came, as he emerged the submarine sank.

Yves Nicole, skipper of the trawler Yette II, related how he rescued the seven survivors.

"Shortly after the submarine passed us, we got out our net, stopped the engine and started trawling," he said.

"At that moment I seemed to hear shouts in the far distance. I told the mate and we listened together. After a while we again heard cries for help.

"We could see nothing, but I climbed the mast and caught sight of seven heads bobbing in the water.

"We promptly cut the nets, started the engine and rushed full speed in the direction of the heads. Three of the men clung to one buoy and four to another.

"We hauled aboard the first three in bad shape and semi-conscious. The four others, among them the commander, seemed to have suffered less.

"We did all we could, rubbed them down, gave them dry clothes and blankets, and even warmed their feet on the engine. Our efforts were rewarded. The three soon came to. We immediately speeded to Cherbourg.
