The Pound

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 26.—(By the Canadian Press)—The average value of the pound sterling to be effective from Feb. 1 to Feb. 15 will be \$4.06. During the present half month the value was \$4.09. The value was fixed in a memorandum to customs collectors by the Department of National Revenue today. The Department declares the average value twice each month to guide collectors in levying the special duty on certain goods imported from Great Britain of a class or kind produced in Canada.
