THE GUARDIAN LOCAL NEWS

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

The S. S. City of London makes two round trips on West River today.

A PROHIBITION summons returnable Tuesday has been served on George Essory for first offence.

Coal arrivals for A. Pickard & Co. are Schir, Daisy with Intercolonial Nut, and Ceto with Reserve Run of Mine.

MANY were attracted last evening by the excellent photographic display of prominent citizens on exhibition in Gavin, Gentzel & Co's., new show case, which is much improved by the illumination of an electric light.

DURING the rough weather for the past few weeks the S. S. City of London has made her regular schedule trips on time which speaks volumes for Captain Craig and his crew. The steamer is continuing to increase her popularity as is evidenced by her large cargoes and passenger lists.

The S. S. City of London had 40 passengers and a full cargo of general merchandise to Belfast and Orwell yesterday afternoon. The return cargo consisted of 130 tobacco boxes, 45 cases (government stamped) chickens, 22 sheep, 9 hogs, 1 cow and 10 boxes produce.

The football team of St. Francis Xavier College, Antigonish came to the City by the Princess last night and this afternoon at C. A. A. grounds will play St. Dunstan's team. The Saint F. X. team recently tied Dalhousie, champions of Nova Scotia, and a great match will be witnessed today.

THE Electra arrived last night about seven o'clock with three passengers, E. Parkman, Montague, Isaac and Mr. Geddings, Murray Harbor and the following cargo: 550 cases capned meats, 200 boxes trap pills, 6 dressed hogs, 13 hals hides, 4 bags flour, and 11 packages sundries. This will probably be her last trip of the season as the heavy trade in the eastern end more than taxes her capacity.

The schooner Corona, Capt. Anderson, shed loading yesterday and will sail first favorable wind for Demerara. The cargo consists of 1500 barrels of potatoes, 20 head of cattle on deck, 100 geese, 150 fowls, 100 turkeys 450 bags of oats, 125 bags potatoes, 70 boxes of canned meats and lobsters. The shippers were John McQuillan, Charles Lyons, and W. J. Dean. The last will accompany the vessel to the West Indies.

Rev. Howard W. Sprague, D. D., the present pastor of Queen Square Methodist church has decided to accept the call to Centenary church tendered him by that congregation and sent word yesterday to that effect. Rev. Geo. M. Campbell of Centenary, has already expressed his acceptance of the call to Queen Square church, so that in July next the two large city churches will simply exchange pastors. The transfer will go into effect the second Sunday in July, 1905. St. John Sun.

Beyond Judge Blanchard yesterday George Manson was committed to stand trial in Supreme Court for murder.

The Bonavista arrived in port yesterday with a large cargo of general merchandise. She leaves today with a full cargo of live stock and produce.

JUSTICE Sedgewick will act as chief justice of the Supreme Court of Canada during the remainder of the term, in the absence of Sir Elzear Taschereau, who is administrator of Canada. Judge Sedgewick is an uncle of Rev. W. H. Sedgewick pastor of Zion church here.

At a meeting of the P. E. I. Football League held last night, it was decided that the tie for the senior football championship of P. E. I. between St. Dunstan and the Abegweits be played off next Thursday. The game could not be arranged earlier by the Saints.

The death of James Gordon, New Perth which took place Tuesday night removed from that locality a well known and generally respected resident. Some seven years ago he received injuries from a stone which he was lifting falling on his breast and these injuries since developed into the illness that ultimately was the cause of his death. Some weeks ago he went to Quincey, Mass. to undergo treatment from his brother Dr. J. A. Gordon but this was of no avail. He returned last Friday night accompanied by his brother who was able to stay only a day at his bedside. The deceased who was born at New Perth, 64 years ago, was a son of the late James Gordon who died in 1885, at the age of 87, and who was the son of Donald Gordon, one of the pioneers of Three Rivers, in whose memory a simple monument of enduring granite was raised over their remains on the beautiful island of Brudenell. The unveiling of this monument with an interesting ceremonial, at a centenary celebration was among the events of the province in the summer of 1887. James Gordon was an active and energetic member of the committee who were entrusted with the carrying out of a commendable undertaking. The deceased was the ninth of a family of twelve. There survive him three brothers, Daniel in New Perth; Dr. John A. in Quincey, Mass., and William in Cardigan, and five sisters, Margaret on the homestead; Isabel, wife of Leroy McMillan, in New Hampshire; Elizabeth, widow of the late William Macdonald in Georgetown; Jessie, widow of the late Richard Drake in Quincey, Mass., and Matilda L. residing with her brother Dr. Gordon. The late Mrs. Walter Burke, formerly of Southport, and latterly of Montreal and the late Mrs. Isaac L. Dickie of the United States were also his sisters. The deceased was the only son remaining on the homestead, married Miss Lydia McMillan, sister of James McMillan, V. S. of Charlottetown. A widow, one son and two daughters are left to mourn a loving husband and father.

The Princess arrived last night at 8.10 and the express at 8.25.

The Saint Francis Xavier football team is registered at the Revere Hotel.

CHARLES McQuillan will referee the Saints' football match this afternoon.

The steamer Minto last night came to this port from Pictou where she has been calling during the past few days.

It is probable that a joint political meeting will be held in the Market hall next Thursday evening. The Charlottetown local candidates and others will be the speakers.

A NUMBER of houses in the city have been entered during the past few nights and goods stolen therefrom. Householders would do well to keep their cellars, hatches, windows and doors locked at night.

PROF. J. W. ROBERTSON passed through the city yesterday en route from Middleton, N. S., to his home in Ottawa. He was in the former place in connection with the Macdonald Schools, of which system he is the head. Mr. Robertson confirmed his resignation from the Dominion Department of Agriculture but would not discuss the matter. - St. John Telegraph.

No news has yet arrived in Sydney about the steamer Donald, which is now nearly two weeks overdue. The Donald left Marble Mountain on Saturday, November 12th, and was due at Chatham, whither she was bound, the following Monday, with a cargo of crushed dolomite. The general belief is that the steamer foundered in the heavy gale of the night of Monday, Nov. 14th and it is feared that her whole crew of fifteen men went down with her. The last seen of the Donald was when she bore away from Cranberry Head, after having landed Pilot Cann. The Donald was commanded by Capt. Roseland, owned in New York, and built in Liverpool thirty years ago. She had been employed in the fruit trade between New York and the West Indies, and made her first trip to Sydney about a month ago, when she loaded tar and pitch from the Dominion Chemical Co. to Port Amberg, New York. It is thought by many that the wreckage which came ashore at French River P. E. I. on Sunday and Monday and previously referred to in The Guardian may be from that wreck.

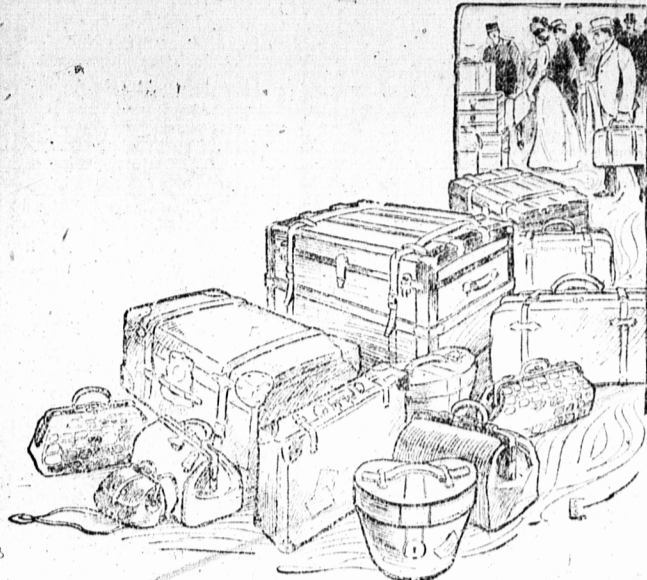

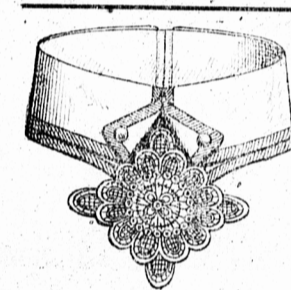

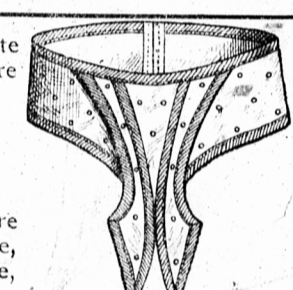

OTTAWA, November 21.—The poll tax of \$20 on Chinese entering Canada, went into effect on the first of January last, and so far not a single celestial has paid this high rate this year. Half the amount of the poll tax, which last year amounted to \$250,000, goes to the British Columbia government so that province will suffer financially to a considerable extent this year.

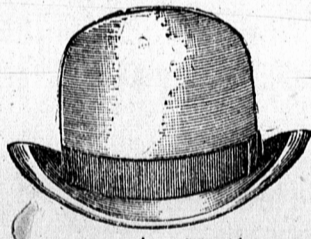
