J. J. MacDonald, M. Can. Soc. C. E., who has been visiting his brother, A. B. MacDonald at Vernon River passed through the city Wednesday morning en route to Kansas City, Mo., where he goes to accept a position on the staff of Wadell and Harrington Consulting Bridge experts. Mr. MacDonald is a graduate of McGill University, Montreal, where he has paid special attention to that branch of science which treats on bridge and design. The Dept. of Agriculture has taken up a new line of work in the establishment of Women's Institutes. Ten years ago Farmers' Institutes were organized here and have been of great value in the development of Agriculture. For the last 3 years a Woman's Convention has been held in connection with the Household Science Exhibition in Summerside and the Commissioner of Agriculture has proposed and has outlined a plan of organization. Women's Institutes in Ontario are doing a good work. There are now 522 with a total membership of 13,841. In the year 1909, 4,770 meetings were held at which 6,832 addresses were given and which were attended by 119,364 people. The older parts of the Province are pretty well organized and the work is gradually extending to the new sections where the women are the Farmers' Institutes, the minimum membership fee 25c which fee is to provide for the expenses connected with the holding of the meetings. The Dept. of Agriculture undertakes to provide lecturers at least twice a year and also to provide the Institutes with suitable literature to assist them in carrying on their meetings. One has already been organized at York with a membership of 26. Meetings are to be held the second and fourth Monday of each month. It is expected that another organization will soon be completed at Tyne Valley and in other sections the question is being discussed. There is every reason to think that the good results attending their organization in Ontario will soon be felt here.
