### Canadians Injured In Train Wreck

DEANS, N. J., June 8.—Between 25 and 30 persons were injured when an Atlantic City to New York express train ploughed into a derailed freight just west of here tonight.

Two passengers, Mr. and Mrs. Rodique, of Montreal, are among the injured. They were taken to Middlesex County Hospital, at New Brunswick, N. J. with others. The locomotive and first three cars of the six-car express plunged over an eight-foot embankment. The last three cars, which were parlor cars, left the rails but did not go over the bank.

Hurry calls brought ambulances and physicians from New Brunswick, five miles east of here. The engineer of the express train was thrown from his cab into a deep brook at the bottom of the embankment and was almost drowned before rescuers reached him. He suffered fractures of both legs.

The fireman was seriously hurt. Four physicians and four nurses, returning to New York from a convention in Atlantic City, were aboard the train. They administered emergency treatment to several of their fellow passengers.

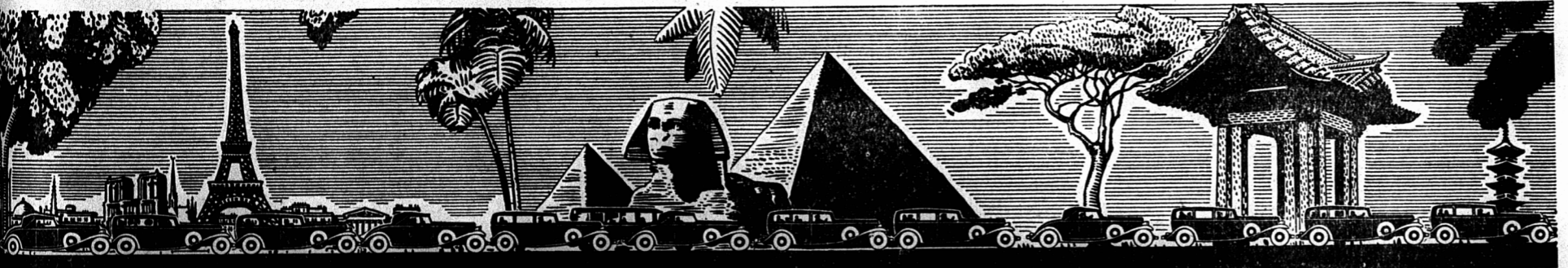
