Prime Minister Bennett Commended

BOYD EXPECTS TO LAND IN ENG. AT NOON

Liberals And Conservatives Send Best Wishes

To Canada's Premier In His Representation Of Dominion At The Imperial Conference.

(Special to the Guardian)
TORONTO, Oct. 9.—Differences of political opinion among the members of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in session at the Royal York today, were abandoned when the assembly united in approving a cable to Prime Minister, F. B. Bennett, offering him good wishes in his representation of Canada at the Imperial Conference. The cable, obviously inspired by the reports of his historic utterances yesterday, was clearly worded so as not to indicate the Chamber's approval of any particular economic theory, but it nevertheless was significant of the feeling of a large number of members, that the Canadian Prime Minister's proposals are good ones. The cable said: "Irrespective of political opinion or of adherence to any one system of Empire or Canadian economic policy, the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in convention assembled, sends you greetings and good wishes in your representation of Canada at the Imperial Conference."
"Let us send it to 'R. B.' just as an expression of good wishes to one of our fellow from a lot of good fellows," said Col. J. H. Woods, President of the Chamber, in submitting the draft cable to the Assembly.

NO DECISION FOR SOME DAYS

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The British Cabinet met this afternoon to consider the offer of reciprocal tariff preferences made at the Imperial Conference yesterday by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada, an offer which involved the placing of a ten percent tariff on foreign products by the Nations of the British Commonwealth, in order to give a like preference to British products. What decision was reached by the Cabinet Council is a matter which will, in all probability, not be made known for some days, not at least until after it has been communicated to the heads of the Imperial Conference Delegations.

Getting Stricter

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—The Department of National Revenue has tightened up the Customs regulations to prevent shipment of liquor from one Canadian port to another being diverted to the United States. The purpose of the changes and regulations of the Vedas incident of a month ago, when a steamer sailed from Montreal with a cargo of ale and beer, ostensibly for Winnipeg, but which was lighted to small vessel when the Vedas was near Detroit. The Vedas was arrested by the Preventive Officers of the Dominion Government and taken to Windsor, where the ship was tied up, awaiting the department's decision. That decision has now been reached, and it is to refer the matter to the law courts.

Imperial Conference Invited to Canadian Capital Early in 1931

Reciprocal Preferences Offered by Dominion Prime Minister—General Support.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The heads of the Imperial Conference delegations—as the heads of Governments—met at No. 10 Downing street today to discuss the questions of high policy involved in the clear-cut offer of reciprocal preference made by Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada, today. It is proposed to establish a committee on Imperial Economic Co-operation which will investigate not only reciprocal preferences but the scheme of import boards, of bulk purchases and other suggested methods of developing inter-Empire trade. The main committee will establish sub-committees on the various subjects.

Killed At Sydney

INTEGRAL IS SAFE AFTER 49 DAY TRIP

Grave Fears Were Felt For Gallant Vessel, Which Weathered Countless Storms.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 9.—The schooner Integral is safe at Barbados. Grave fears which had arisen for the vessel and her crew of five as a result of her failure to arrive at the West Indies port within a reasonable time, were set at rest today when cable advices to Zwicker and Co., the schooner's owners at Lunenburg, reported her safe arrival after a voyage from Halifax of forty-nine days, one of the longest on record for the distance.

Edinburgh To Confer Honors On 4 Dom. Prens.

EDINBURGH, Scotland, Oct. 9.—A committee of members of the Edinburgh Town Council have recommended the conferring of the freedom of the city upon Prime Ministers Bennett, Scullin, Forbes and Herzog, of the four great Dominions. The matter will be discussed in the meeting of council on Thursday.

LLANDUDNO, Wales, Oct. 9.—An attempt of the Independent Labour Party, led by Archibald Fenner Brockway, member from the east division of Leyton, to force upon the Government a policy of immediate action for total disarmament, was defeated in the annual Labour Party conference here today. Brockway moved a resolution, calling upon the Government to embark upon a policy of leading to total disarmament within the shortest period, irrespective of what other governments might do and instructing the conference executives to prepare definite plans for organized resistance to war for submission to the next annual conference.
