Stalin Played Secondary Part

NEW BIOGRAPHY REVEALS HIM ONE OF FIVE WHO SEIZED POWER.

NEW YORK, June 1.—Joseph Stalin, now virtual dictator of the Soviet Union, played a much greater role in the earliest days of the Russian revolution than the outside world supposed. This is one of the most striking facts revealed by the first full biography of the Bolshevik leader ever published, "Stalin," by Isaac Don Levine, just brought out by the Cosmopolitan Book Corporation here. The limelight of world attention in the first years after the fall of the Romanoff dynasty was focused upon men like Lenin, Trotsky, Zinoviev and failed to pick out the iron-willed Georgian who now dominates the country. The erroneous impression was created that Stalin's part in the revolution was secondary.

Lenin's "Right Hand"

His biography refutes this impression, showing him as one of the prime movers of the events of 1917, the occupant of strategic political posts and a military leader of the first water. It reveals him as Lenin's "right-hand man," in many respects closer to the father of Bolshevism than Leon Trotsky. Lenin's attack on Stalin for his rude political methods did not come until years later.

Stalin, it appears, was one of the inner group of five who engineered the actual seizure of power. Thereafter, Levine says, "Stalin became more than ever Lenin's right-hand man." If Lenin used a political steam-roller to crush all opposition inside or outside the Communist Party, Stalin was at the wheel of the steam-roller. Moreover, in solving the problem of the mutual relations among the nearly 200 different national and racial groups under the red flag, Stalin took the lead.

"Stalin more than any other leaders of his party," Levine writes, "is responsible for the cementing of the federation known as the Soviet Union. It was a problem of the first magnitude."

Stalin-Trotsky Duel

The author served as correspondent in Russia in the first years of the revolution. He has not been there since the emergence of Stalin or during the period of strife between the Stalin and Trotsky factions.

The bulk of the book is devoted to narrative of the epic duel between Stalin and Trotsky. The author seems to have followed rather closely the version of the duel given by Trotsky himself.

There is more information about the human, personal side of Stalin's career in this book than in anything else as yet published. Levine gathered all the facts available in print anywhere. Nevertheless the sum-total of that information is still extremely small. His home life, his wives, his children are a small, almost negligible part of the Soviet leader's existence. Stalin lives for his cause. The story of his life simmers down to the story of that cause.

R-101 CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE FROM SPIRIT WORLD

LONDON, June 1. British United Press)—A message from the late Flight Lieutenant H. C. Irwin, captain of the R-101, describing the airship's disaster, is said to have been received two days after his death through a medium at the National Laboratory of Research. The contents of the message, which was long and somewhat disconnected, containing a great deal of technical detail, have been examined by experts in airship building who stated that it was impossible for the message to have come from one who was not thoroughly acquainted with the R-101 and airships generally.

The cause of the disaster, according to the message, was explosion caused by friction in an electric storm. It went on to state that the whole bulk of the dirigible was much too heavy for her engine capacity.

London Letter

LONDON, June 1.—(U.P.)—This large, unfriendly city shelters 190,000 foreigners most of whom insist they are working only until they have amassed sufficient money to return home and live in ease—but few ever realize this ambition.

The bank accounts of these visitors show they accomplished the first part of their desires but the black hair of the lively Italian has turned white and his pretty bride is now a bit fat; his children speak perfect English and have some difficulty in understanding the mother tongue.

Into the foreign section called Soho they drift. There one hears the babel of strange tongues where "Bon Jour, Madams" mixes with "Guten Morgen, Fraulein" and there is a different smell in every block. There the tourists flock to escape the heavy English food, for in Soho they may be assured of the finest delicacies of the continent.

In the many restaurants one may see a dignified Englishman and a pretty companion sampling native dishes, but abstaining from the delight of all Frenchman—smalls and froglegs. Also at a nearby table may be an entire family at an old-fashioned happy dinner where well modulated tones are not the best part of digestion.

Wealthy, She Works

In one shop sits a portly, gray-haired old woman. She has a bank account of more than \$500,000 yet she is at her place at the counter each day, supervising the work of her two sons who now manage the business.

Then there is the Frenchman who sells wine during the day time, writes reviews for the French press during the evening and spends all his idle moments growing mushrooms in his cellar. He, too, talks of going back to the Paris he loves, but he is still here.

Life-long friendships are born in the twisted, dirty streets of the foreign colony where even the stalwart English "bobbie" looks out of place directing traffic and bringing peace among quarrelsome families. For the most part, however, the foreigners give little trouble.

The word battles are heated and numerous. Men in shirt sleeves stand about and argue—their faces flushed—and courteously pause a moment or two to greet a passing friend before continuing their debate. Occasionally, of course, passions break. Then the echo of the policeman's whistle is heard. A few moments later, however, Soho is about its business.

Unwritten Law

The visitors bring the codes of their countries to their adopted land. Recently an Italian murdered his wife because he returned from a trip and found she had been friendly with one of his friends during his absence.

"I had looked upon her as a delicate little flower," he said in court. "Its beauty passed out of my life. I did not want to live."

The court took into consideration the plea of the prisoner and the fact that he had tried to end his own life, and gave him a light prison sentence. This, occurring in a land which hangs its murderers, precipitated considerable discussion in the press as to the legality of the "unwritten law."

But the Italian colony understood. To its swarthy residents it was not something that could be written in black and white in law books. They understood and approved.

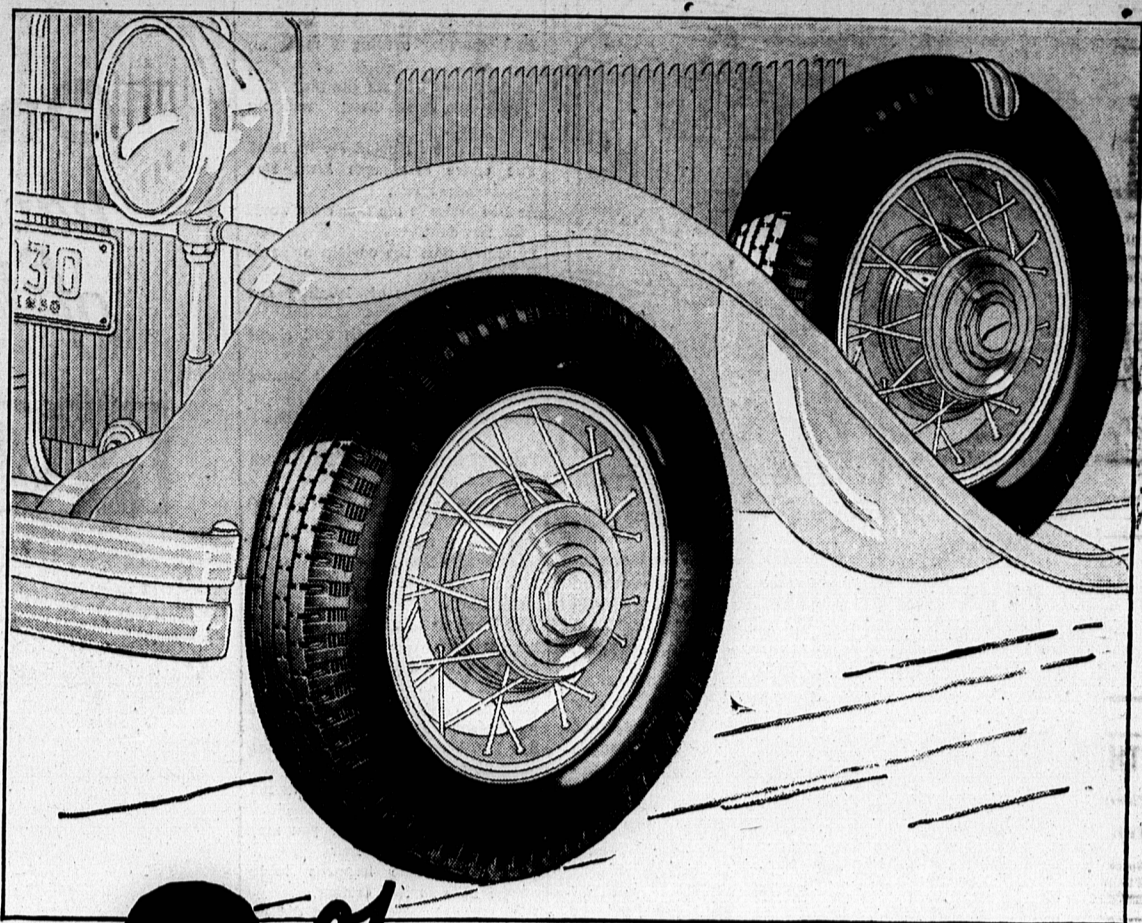
BEE ATTACK PLANE PILOT

PARIS, June 1. (British United Press)—An attack by a swarm of vicious bees was the novel but unpleasant experience of aeroplane passengers on a flight from Paris to Marseilles.

During a particularly rough bit of the journey one of the ten bee hives that were part of the planes freight fell and burst open, allowing the bees to escape and invade the cabin. After vain efforts to drive them off, passengers protected their faces with scarfs and handkerchiefs. The only real sufferer was the pilot, Casanova, who dared not take his hands away from the controls to battle with the bees, but was forced to sit stoically at his post while the vicious creatures inflicted numerous stings on his face and hands.

VIRTUAL PALACE BUILT ON PLAINS

JUNCTION, Tex., June 1.—(U.P.)—A palace fit for a king is being built on the wide open prairies of Texas by W. L. Moody, III, of Galveston.

Between the two forks of Johnson creek of the North Llano river, Moody is building his bit of paradise. It is far from the noise of drilling oil wells and from the cry of workers in cotton compresses. But despite its apparent seclusion, Moody has reduced the distances to

places by having his own landing field where he can set down his airplane.

When the place is completed and the comforts of the city have been brought to the ranges, he will have spent about \$1,000,000.

From the "front gate" of his place to the mansion it is six miles over hard surfaced roads.

From the home, set on a cliff between the two forks of Johnson creek, guests look down on a huge artificial lake with boats and fish of many kinds. In the woods are deer.

The home has 17 rooms. There is a system of air cooling, and the electric refrigeration system is said to have cost \$12,000. The house sits on a 100-foot cliff. It is rustic, made of field stone.

WHITE MAN'S MAGIC AWES NATIVES

LONDON, June 1. (British United Press)—A simple knowledge of chemistry saved a critical situation among native harvest workers in Kenya colony. Two Lumbwa members of a mixed gang of Kikuyu and Lumbwa natives, finding themselves un-

successful in their suit for the hands of two Kikuyu maidens, laid a curse on the unfortunate girls, who became critically ill, with the result that all the Kikuyu gang refused to work until the curse was lifted.

The British manager rose to the occasion and by an exhibition of "white man's magic" induced the two men to lift the curse. Assembling the gang he gave each man a piece of stone and poured water over each piece, explaining that the magic would cause the stone of the guilty men to crack and smoke. Carbide of calcium looks very much like stone.

When it was seen that the stones of the guilty pair were behaving in peculiar manner, the whole gang bolted except the two cursers who dropped to their knees and confessed to the whole thing, offering to lift the curse. The next day the girls had completely recovered and all the natives returned to work.
