Mt. Stewart

NOW, ARE YOU CONVINCED??

It is hoped that the previous broadcasts and articles have stimulated some thought on the problems of tuberculosis and what the T. B. League is doing about it. If they have impressed on you the value of early X-ray and the excessive cost of neglected T.B. perhaps they have convinced you that you must do something about it this year.

You may however still have some doubts as to the results and the ability of the system to deal with each individual when coping with the large numbers mentioned in the last article. Perhaps a description of the procedure of the Mobile X-ray Unit would be timely.

The unit consists of a large van and trailer, painted white. Inside the body of the van is the X-ray apparatus and a small office. The source of power can either be derived from plugging in to an existing source or from the generator carried on the trailer. This latter makes the unit independent of a source of power in a non-electrified rural district. The unit is manned by two X-ray technicians, who have now had considerable experience in mass surveying.

The unit operates on a schedule which requires it to be at a certain X-ray centre between fixed hours on a certain day. These places and times will be published weekly in this paper on Saturday and announced each evening over CFXY. In addition notices will be posted in school districts and canvassing committees from Women's Institutes and Catholic Women's Leagues will contact you to make appointments.

The actual process of being X-rayed only takes a minute. A registrar, usually a voluntary helper, takes your name and address, and in the case of a child the parent's name. If you can spare fifty cents for this it is paid to the registrar, the maximum charge for families is \$2.50, regardless of the number of children. If you feel that you cannot afford to pay 50c - BE X-RAYED ANYWAY. As the X-ray is taken a serial number is photographed on the film, this is YOUR identifying number.

The total number the X-ray unit can do in a day depends largely upon the preliminary organization. This is undertaken by the executive secretary of the T.B. League working through committees of local organizations, such as W.I.'s, C.W.L.'s, Can. Legion, service clubs, employers, etc. The

need is to have a steady flow of people. In the larger centres of population the people are organized into groups of 25 or so and given appointments within half hour periods. If a steady rate can be maintained the unit can cope with 350 in a full day's work.

In the rural areas it is not desirable to move the mobile unit more than once a day if it can be avoided and in view of the large number of school districts which must be visited it is possible to X-ray only once in each centre. It is therefore important that you make sure you can keep the appointment for the day in question. For this reason ample warning of the schedule is given by the League. If it is impossible for you to appear you may be able to catch the Unit at its next stop some time later, or to attend one of the free clinics in Charlottetown or Summerside, at your convenience.

At the end of each day's survey the films are mailed or taken to the sanatorium for development and diagnosis. If your case is negative you will hear no more and can literally breathe easily. If your film shows that you have active T.B. you will be notified within two weeks by the Department of Public Health. This information is confidential to yourself and your doctor. You will probably be required to come in to the sanatorium or to the clinic at Summerside for confirmation by the taking of a large X-ray.

Depending upon; the stage of T.B. found, vacancies in the sanatorium, or facilities you have for home treatment, will be determined how your case will be dealt with.

Where sanatorium treatment is provided and if you are the breadwinner of the family the Dept. of Public Health and Welfare investigate your financial situation and where necessary certain support may be provided for your dependents. Every case is dealt with according to its own merits.

If you have to remain at home for treatment a public health nurse will visit you and advise on treatment and measures to prevent spread of the germ.

This is the last of this series on the work of the T.B. League. However you are reminded to watch for the announcements each Saturday of the schedule of the Mobile X-ray Unit. The picture below shows you what to look for at the X-ray centre.
