## STATEMENT OF LECTURE ON DIRECTORS RE PHILOSOPHY HOSPITAL FUND OF HEALTH

**By Dr. J. C. Lawson, a Former Islander and Noted Speaker.**

An interesting, analytical, and graphic lecture on the subject, "The Philosophy of Health" with its keynote, "to get to the finality of the origin and result of things," was delivered last evening by Dr. J. C. Lawson, noted dietitian and osteopath. A former Islander, though an absentee from the province for thirty-five years, Dr. Lawson stated that he recognized many familiar faces. His message, he announced, would be along the lines of that delivered all over the continent during the last twelve years.

Man, the speaker explained in opening, is triune,—mental, moral, physical.

It is necessary to get to the finality of the origin and result of things. Man when he came into existence, and at first dawn of intelligence was an animate and pulsating being. Between the cradle and the grave man passes through the vicissitudes of good and bad health. There has never been a cure worked out for disease Dr. Lawson stated. Disease is caused by lack of knowledge of law and order. Law is founded on transgression. Law tries to rectify the idiosyncracies and wrongs of men. When one is doing right one is healthy and happy. When one is doing wrong he suffers or is made to suffer. The law says thou shalt not.

Thou shalt not go to excess.  
Thou shalt not over eat.  
Thou shalt not eat wrongly.  
Thou shalt not hate thy neighbor.  
Man's actions constitute all his distress. There is no cure for disease, but there is a coming back to the place of beginning,—health. There is only one reason for disease, that is bad habits. No immoderate man ever lives long. If each man did the best for himself there would be no need for law or jails. In Iceland, where each regards the rights of every other, there are no jails. Only sick people hate. Harmony is the greatest thing in the world, Dr. Lawson said.

In personal reference the speaker stated that he left Charlottetown in 1895, after teaching in North River. He then went to college and taught in Regina. He was told that he could not live five years. Then he began to formulate that which he is speaking now. It was necessary to get back to that with which he came into the world, light, air, food and water. Men are seeking vainly for cures. "Thou shalt not depart till thou has paid the utmost farthing." The transgression of the law brings its own punishment. Ignorance may be put forward as an excuse, but "knock and it shall be opened unto you." A cold is not caught. A cold is a result of a constitutional condition.


All disease starts from the stomach and intestinal tract. In 1918 Dr. Lawson was sent to Drumheller by the Alberta Government during the flu epidemic. He was there for three months in direct contact. One does not catch the flu; one makes it. If one suffers with a headache one should know the reason for that headache—the disregard for a law. Overeating is a great transgression. Few people can say no to appetite. Nobody but oneself is there to deal with. Nature is with the one who tries. He is serving the Lord who is keeping his body pure. The body is the temple of the Lord. The speaker wondered how a person can be a good Christian and be sick all the time. The cure is in the hands of the individual. There will come a time when every person will be his or her own doctor. The speaker prophesied. The remedy for cancer is a clean life, a pure blood stream. The day will come when sickness and suffering shall pass away. When man went first; contrary to law he then began to suffer. He has been suffering ever since.

Men are not honest to themselves; they will not say "unclean, unclean." J. D. Rockefeller at fifty had a bad stomach. At ninety he has a better stomach than he had at fifty. All through his own efforts. Every organ in the body according to biology is made to last 150 years. Men in Mexico live to be 150 years of age. They do not worry. They have all they need. They do not worry, as the ordinary man does, about what they think they ought to have. luxury.

"Don't worry, don't hurry, and you have one of the secrets of long life." Dr. Lawson stated. "Don't worry. Everything will come out all right. If it does not come out all right worry won't help it."

Worry is the cause of so called nervous breakdowns. At Falconwood it is the country of the young. U-

ing which interval the Government prepared amendments it proposed to embody in the tariff resolutions. On the return of the members, the items were run through quickly. Government amendments were adopted, the tariff bill passed through all stages with little opposition, and the work of the session was complete. An amendment moved in committee on the bill to the item which increased gasoline duties was declared lost. Hon. J. L. Ralston, former Minister of National Defence, was the mover of the amendment which provided that the increases would not be applicable to gasoline used by fishermen.

Before the Commons finally cleared up its business, Mr. Mackenzie King stated that the Opposition was foregoing the preparation of a number of other amendments in view of the need for speed. Premier Bennett replied he was sure all members of the House would realize that the Leader of the Opposition was not abandoning any principle in so doing.

Tariff Bill Passed By Senate  
The Government's tariff bill was given three readings and passed by the Senate this afternoon a few minutes before the official prorogation ceremonies were scheduled to begin. The sitting was very short and consisted in the introduction of the bill by Senator Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor, and a short reply by Senator Raoul Dandurand, Liberal Leader. The bill was designated, the Minister of Labor said, to give employment to about 25,000 Canadians and to accelerate Canadian production in basic industries. It did not pretend to be a general revision of the tariff, but only an emergency measure designed to end unemployment. The general revision would take place at the next session. Senator Dandurand said he and his colleagues were not of the same opinion as the Government on the results of the measure. He did not believe it would end unemployment in Canada nor arrest the period of depression. Canada's present distress conditions resulted from world conditions, he said, and could be improved only by increasing the purchasing power of the people. This, he was sure, would not result from the higher duties set in motion by the Government.

**Throne Speech**  
The text of the speech from the throne as read by His Excellency the Governor General at the prorogation late this afternoon of the special session of Parliament reads: Honourable members of the Senate, members of the House of Commons. "I thank you for the prompt consideration which you have given to the measures submitted to you, and which are deemed necessary for the relief of unemployment in the Dominion. It is my fervent hope and confident belief that these measures will prove effective in accomplishing the purposes for which they have been enacted. Honourable members of the Senate, members of the House of Commons, in relieving you from the duties to which you were summoned I commend to the Divine protection the people of this Dominion."

Messrs Clarence and Osborn Wood, the Messrs Arlen and Evelyn Wood, Alexandra accompanied by Miss Reta Wood of Mt. Herbert, and Mabel Newman of Pownal, were visitors to Cross Roads and Charlottetown, on Sunday evening, Sept. 7th.
