"FREDNES" IN PORT

—The S. S. "Frednes" Capt. Rod in command, arrived in port yesterday from Turk's Island with 15000 tons of salt for Carvell Bros. The steamer discharged a few hundred tons at New York, the balance of the cargo being left here. When the ship is discharging she will be loaded with potatoes for Norfolk, Va. A large number of men are engaged at this work three shutes being used for conveying the salt to the waiting cars. The salt is loaded into large tubs which are hoisted to the chutes. Here two men tip them, two tubs full being sufficient to fill a cart. The salt is then weighed as it passes to the warehouse where it is stored. This salt comes in a large size and when it reaches the warehouse a quantity is put through a crusher where it is reduced to ordinary coarse salt and bagged.

'The Blue Danube' At The Capitol

ALSO THE POPULAR "COLLEGIAN SERIES"

It finally took the movies to bring to the screen, with all its grandeur and romance, "The Blue Danube," in a fascinating picture of that title which opened at the Capitol Theatre yesterday.

A more impressive love story could not have been conceived for the theme of this pictorially magnificent production released by Pathé. "The Blue Danube" is an amazing study in character contrast, mixing the humble peasants of the hinterland with the pompous plutocrats of royalty. Leatrice Joy makes an appealing daughter of a poor peasant family whose winsome charm catches the eye of Nils Asther, in the role of a son of nobility. Scenes of the gay festival of the Danube, where Asther violates all precedent by selecting the beautiful peasant girl as the queen, are pictorial triumphs for Director Paul Sloane. From here he carries his story speedily and adroitly through a complicated plot which never for a minute reveals the next development.

The situation of a girl apparently abandoned by her lover marrying a hideous and scheming hunchback, is presented in a masterly style, and Sloane has extracted the utmost from a climax that is mysterious and spell-binding.

Miss Joy and Asther have fine characterizations, while Joseph Schildkraut gives a striking portrayal as the hunchback. Others in credible parts are Seena Owen, Frank Reicher and Albert Gran.

a good demand for storage stocks. Winnipeg Man.—The egg market here continues quiet, and there is a very limited movement of storage stocks into consumption. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs, extras 40, firsts 37, seconds 23 delivered cases returned. A few shipments of pullet eggs are being brought in from the coast.

Edmonton.—There has been a further falling off in fresh egg receipts here and storage stocks are moving into consumption liberally. Dealers here are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 32 to 35 cents; firsts 30 to 33 cents; seconds 20 to 22 cents.

Vancouver.—There has been a further decline in egg receipts here and an advance of one cent on all grades. Small peewee seconds and pullet extras are now consisting sixty percent of total receipts. Car lot shipments to the east during the past week amounted to only two cars.

Montreal, Que., Oct. 14.—A further scarcity in Ontario fresh eggs boosted the price up another cent on the Montreal wholesale produce market today. Ontario fresh extras sold at 34 cents while firsts sold from 33 to 34 cents. There was very little sale for British Columbia fresh
