N. B. Potato Growers Are Worried About Export Permits To U.S.

HARTLAND, N.B., Jan. 13 — An inference that export permits on potatoes going to United States markets will again be refused by New Brunswick dealers divert to the United States potatoes which should be going to the Canadian market is seen in a telegram received today by New Brunswick shippers from E. J. Chalmers, administrator of fruit and vegetable markets, held on the 16th and 17th. Apparently acting on complaints from Ontario and Quebec wholesalers, Mr. Chalmers asked the New Brunswick shippers if they were refusing Canadian orders and the same time shipping tubers to United States markets. He requested them to state, as of Jan. 11, the number of Canadian orders they had been unable to fill, and the reasons therefor.

Stormy weather which blocked roads both in the Maritime and Ontario and Quebec have interfered with movement of potatoes to market. As a result, some consumer centres have suffered a temporary shortage and demands have suffered. Local dealers,
