Father Baines, C.S.S.R., preached a most inspiring sermon, taking as his text the first two verses from the 12th chapter of the Epistle to the Hebrews, "Wherefore seeing we also are encompassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith; for for the joy that was set before him, he endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." The Rev. Father Baines reminded his hearers that this was All Saints Day, a day on which we especially remember our Christian brethren, only those who are living on earth now, but those who are in the world unseen. The question, he said, must occur to us, where are they? What are they doing? The answer is given in the text. They are witnessing, and as they are witnessing they must be living. They are not dead, but alive and working. St. Paul wrote that there are two bodies, the earthly body and the spiritual body; the earthly body which is necessary for us here on earth and the spiritual body which we shall inhabit when our work here is done. Jesus Christ uttered these words from the Cross: "Into Thy Hands I commend My Spirit." Death is not the end only, but also a beginning.

Air Minister Speaks Highly Of Island Man The following letter was received recently by Mr. George A. MacLean, P.E.I., from Hon. C. G. Power, Minister of National Defence for Air: Ottawa, October 20, 1942. Mr. George Allen MacLean, Lewes, P.E.I. Dear Mr. MacLean: I am writing to say how much all ranks of the Royal Canadian Air Force join with me in warmly congratulating you and the members of your family on the honour and distinction which have come to your son, Flight Lieutenant John Angus MacLean, D.F.C., through the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross for gallantry in the performance of his duty while serving with No. 405 Squadron of the Royal Canadian Air Force. The citation on which this award was made reads as follows: "One night in September, Flight Lieutenant MacLean was captain of an aircraft engaged in an attack on a target in the Ruhr. During the bombing run heavy anti-aircraft fire was encountered. The aircraft sustained damage, the aileron became jammed and when another shell burst immediately below the port wing the aircraft turned on its back and went into a steep inverted climb. Flight Lieutenant MacLean recovered control of the aircraft and released his bombs on the target. On the return flight the aircraft was attacked from below by an enemy fighter. Further damage was sustained. Shortly afterwards the bomber eventually became completely uncontrollable and both he and his crew were compelled to leave by parachute. Throughout this hazardous operation this officer displayed great gallantry, fortitude and devotion to duty. The personnel of the Force are proud of your son's fine service record.
