THE S. S. STANLEY.—The government ice breaker Stanley reached as far as Wentworth Creek this morning, smashing the ice over a wide area as the Sydney Post of the 19th. The steamer is not clearing a single path through the harbor but is circling about cutting wide swaths through the ice as she moves along. This morning she nosed in around all the wharves on the water front and freed them of ice. In some places hard blue ice as thick as 30 inches was encountered and it left to thaw it might have kept the wharves encased for two weeks yet. A stiff breeze from the south is needed now to open the harbor for navigation. Hundreds of people stood on the bank near the ferry wharf this morning and watched the Stanley at work. To see her backing up and ramming the ice close in shore was an interesting spectacle for a landman. People living in the ice well will be obliged to cross on the tracks south of the ferry wharf are still good for crossing.

BIRDS. HOW ARE THEY PROTECTED?

to shoot. No man should kick at paying a license if he is a sportsman. There is a lot of our best shooting ground, the loony, also fishing ponds. Now, don't you think that is keeping the poor man down from getting his share of sport and food? If there was not so much of this the poor man could shoot and sell a few birds for his living, and not protect them so much for the rich in the United States, where there are clubs that have acres leased; also clubs in Canada. They have the money and it seems as though they can do just what they like. Who stopped the sale of wild geese in this province? How many knew it was going to be stopped? Maybe one or two. Was the Migrating Birds Law and the sale of birds discussed in the House at the last session? It is a very important question and the answer is very little said about it until some one is fined and goes before a J.P. Then he is told what a serious offence he has committed. When we have got to pay to shoot moose and deer, why not pay to shoot ducks and geese? It is all game; and make the American sports all pay for their sport. They come here and fish and shoot, and go back and laugh at us for being so hard on the birds. When the people are crying for protection for our fish and game, if some of our sports who have those ponds leased would import some game birds here I think it would be better, and the clubs try some Hungarian partridges in this province, the same as some of the other provinces have done. I do not see why they would not do as well as partridges and give good sport; also prairie chickens.

Now there are trappers all over the world, and I guess this is the only place where they do not pay a license; and then they talk about protection of birds and animals! Why not have a trapper's license? That is a good price, and some might make a good living at it if there were some protection instead of letting everyone trap and shoot muskrats and mink for fun, and leave them in the pond where they are killed. I have seen this kind of thing done often, and the one who sells the skins shows his licenses. At the present time they ship them away to the States, and the number of his license to the parcel, so that there would be some record of the trapper who takes out a license. At the present time they seem to kill muskrats for fun and have done so for years; that is why they are so scarce today. Has our government protected them from being out? Every muskrat that is killed in the spring and summer is a good price, and some of the next year, and they are worth \$1.50 each in season. How many Americans took out a license last year to shoot and fish? I am sure in this part of the country they fished trout and carried a gun without license, and I hope this will be looked after this year; those who go to pay to shoot the game in other provinces, and fish, and pay dearly when we go to the U.S.A. They don't try to get game into the province, but they like to have the best places leased, so that they can shoot them all and let no one else go near and perhaps take some of their rich American friends out to shoot with them without a license in their pocket. Now, is this protection or is it to extort one? We are only protecting birds for a chosen few.

I believe in everyone taking a sporting chance in the Fall, but protect birds in Spring, and if this Spring shooting is allowed to go on the way it has been doing we had better let everyone shoot, or try and stop it altogether, but we cannot do it with three men. I had a good man to take an interest in protection of birds, I think he would do more good than a dozen that care only about the salary that is in it. A man who is a game warden should do nothing else in the Spring but look after the ones who are shooting, and then he will have more than he can do. No Spring shooting means more migratory laws.

Suppose Spring shooting is allowed—

Sixty birds start south in one flock 10
Fall shooting 1/4 are killed 15
Starvation, accidents and death in winter 1/4 are killed 11
Spring shooting 1/4 are killed 34
Spring migration 1/4 are killed 26
Suppose 10 pairs of birds raise 4 young each 20
Then next Fall's flock will be 40
And the species is stationary, unless some catastrophe occurs to increase its loss. Now if Spring shooting is not allowed and all other losses are the same, we get this result 60
Fall shooting 1/4 are killed 15
Starvation, accident and death in winter 1/4 are killed 11
Spring migration 1/4 are killed by accident 8
Thirteen pairs of birds raise to maturity 4 young each 52
Then next Fall's flock will be 78
And the species is increasing 78

Why are we not allowed to use repeating shot guns, when a man is only allowed so many birds per day? I think that cranes, gulls and loons are destructive on smelts

and trout, so why are they protected so much? I have watched gulls following up shoals of smelts and eating them. So why protect a bird that eats a fisherman's living? I have watched big gulls chase small ducks and kill them. If they came into a farmer's field and destroyed his crop there would be something done about it. So why not protect the smelt fisherman the same? Loons are as bad as gulls; so why protect them? Cranes go along streams and destroy more trout than is caught with hook and line. A dozen small trout won't feed a crane for a day, and they carry them to their young, and they destroy wood land where the crane rookeries are.

Now I would like to know if the ones who made the laws for this province looked into this matter before they made those laws, or are they just going by other provinces, or have they ever made any study of birds and their habits? And who makes the laws for this province? The writer of this letter, as well as others, would like to know.
