SUM'SIDE AND WEST

The Latest News From Prince County.

The First annual meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held in their room in the Market Building last night, and was well attended.

The report of the President, Hon. R. C. McLeod referred to the unanimity and good will which characterized the first year's work. Politics, the bane of similar institutions the world over, has been strictly excluded and on this the future usefulness of the Board to a great extent depended. Through the efforts of the Board the Stanley was secured to break up the ice in our harbor last spring which assisted materially in hastening the opening of navigation and our efforts to arrange for a final and practical test of the Summerside Cape Tormentine route, while in a measure successful, were, I regret to say aborted by a series of unfortunate circumstances. The objections that had heretofore been urged against this route were insufficient depth of water in Summerside harbor and want of suitable terminal conditions at Cape Tormentine Pier. While we succeeded in removing the first objection if it really existed by procuring the services of the Dredge, St. Lawrence, we failed in inducing the Minister of Marine to make the necessary changes at Cape Tormentine. Notwithstanding this the Stanley was promised and had come and proved the route feasible but the smallpox scare and lack of terminal facilities at the Cape were used as an excuse to transfer her to the Georgetown-Pictou route. The result however has substantiated our claims that this route is the most direct and feasible one and no doubt eventually it would become the winter road. The report also referred to the move made by the Charlottetown, Souris, and Summerside Boards of Trade in demanding a better telegraph service, which was still under consideration, and which would have satisfactory results. Many other matters would have received attention and the results aimed at have in a large measure been secured. The report ended by the President's good wishes for the future of the organization and the offer of his hearty co-operation in every effort for the advancement of our town. I yield up the honorable position which a year ago you so kindly asked me to fill trusting that my successor in office may carry to completion whatever has been left unfinished and under a new management much more may yet be done.

Mr. Richard Hunt regretted that Mr. McLeod declined the office of President, saying that it would be a great loss to the Board and town as well. He moved that a vote of thanks be tendered the President for his past services which had been of so much value. The motion was carried unanimously. Mr. McLeod thanked the Board for their kind vote of thanks again intimating that he desired not to remain in office as there were others he thought might take hold.

Mr. W. A. Brennan also expressed the wish that Mr. McLeod remain in office. The election of officers then took place and resulted as follows:

The funeral of the late Mr. R. A. Clark, Postmaster of Alberton, was held from his late residence on Sunday, 15th inst., at 2 p.m. It was one of the largest processions ever seen in this section of the country, thus evincing the esteem in which the deceased was held by all classes. The funeral was conducted by the brethren of Zetland Lodge, No. 7, A. F. and A. M., of which the late Mr. Clark was an honored member. The brethren formed in procession at their lodge room, and marched to the house of the deceased, under the command of Bro. G. R. Montgomery, Marshal. The body was then escorted to the Presbyterian Church. The pall bearers consisting of Bros. L. Reenie, D. Montgomery, A. Gordon, J. E. Birch, J. Forsythe, and D. Ramsay. The services at the church were conducted by the Rev. H. I. Gratz, pastor who preached an appropriate sermon from the words: "I am the Resurrection and the Life." At the grave the beautiful and impressive ceremony of the Masonic ritual was rendered, and as the brethren stood around the open grave and committed his body to the ground and as they saw the clouds of the valley fall upon the coffin lid hiding from view the remains of their late brother, they knew that a good and true man had gone to his reward.
