## Marriage Wins Big Arlington Handicap Event

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Marriage, a seven-year-old veteran of stretch runs, added the \$39,300 Arlington handicap to his long list of triumphs, defeating the heavily played favorite, Thumbs up, by a length on Saturday.

Anticlimax was third in this mile and a quarter race which closed the highly successful 36-day Arlington Park meeting. Salko, the only invader from the east, was ailing and well beaten fourth. Marriage plowed down the long

stretch in the grueling head-and-head duel with Thumbs up to the cheers of 20,000. The winner, owned by the turf firm of Rene Corward and Carl Cuppy, of Lufkin, Texas. They picked up a check for \$40,850 for Marriage's victory.

Marriage was overbooked in the waning, returning \$18.40, \$6.40 and \$4.40 across the board.

The winner, ridden by jockey George Burns, ran the distance in 2:03 3-5.

## Haegg Wins One-Mile Run

CLEVELAND, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Gunder Haegg outdistanced three competitors last night to win a speedy one-mile run at the Baldwin-Wallace College track, but his time of 4:05.4 was a tenth below his United States best of 4:05.3.

Haegg took the lead in the second quarter mile and kept it all the way to finish five yards ahead of Bill Hulse, speedy New York University freshman. Hulse made a fast finish to come in a yard ahead of Gil Dodds in an even 4:06 best time ever made by an American runner.

Les Eisenhart, former big ten mile champion from Ohio State University, came in a poor fourth. Hulse's time was seven tenths of a second faster than Glen Cunningham's old record of 4:07.6, which fell to Haegg last week.

## Toronto Argonauts Retain Regatta Honors

PORT DALHOUSIE, Aug. 1.—(CP)—Royal Canadian Henley Regatta honors today remained with Toronto Argonauts but it was only after a stiff three-day battle with the veteran Jim Rice's Ecorse, Mich. crew that the double-blue retained the Canadian sculling honors they won here last year.

At the close of Henley's 61st annual titular meet here Saturday, Argos topped the pack with 58 points compared with 45 for the E-corse.

Nevertheless, with only two championship events to go yesterday, Argos led Ecorse by only two points, the Michigan boatmen having won the meet's two top events, the senior cox and the championship singles to climb within close striking distance of the defending champions.

The senior 154-pound doubles retained the honor, however. Ted Chilcott and Bill Fullerton of Argos easily

defeated Lou Tank and J. Cameron of Ecorse in a two-boat race. Hamilton Leanders, featuring a bunch of juniors and high school boys, finished third in the aggregate with 29.

Next in line were Buffalo West Sides with 28, Detroit Fifth with 19, Belleville, N.J. Nevels, 15, Wrentham, Mich., Eight, Toronto Royal Canadian Air Force, represented by Harry Hutcheson, former St. Catharines, Ont. sculler, with six, and Philadelphia's Falmouths, four.

A Toronto R.C.A.F. four, stroked by Lou Scholes, Jr., son of the late Lou Scholes, a Diamond Sculls winner, won a services half-mile race from the Royal Norwegian Air Force while H.M.C.S. Star of Hamilton defeated a crew from H.M.S. Linaria by six open lengths for the lower lakes whaler title.

Ecorse won the high schools eight with Grose Point, Mich., second.

## Gas Rationing Does Not Bother This Runner

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 1.—(AP)—Willie Dreyer has an occupational gasoline ration card for his automobile, but he hoofs it to and from his job in Richmond every day, a round trip of 30 miles. And he doesn't walk. He runs.

He starts at an hour when he arrives at a Richmond refinery for the swing shift and then starts working moving oil drums.

Dreyer, who says he started running between Oakland and Richmond daily on Feb. 1, estimates he has completed 6,000 miles.

Now 39, he has done some competitive running and says he plans to enter the United States 30,000-metre championships in San Francisco next winter.

Gasoline rationing doesn't bother him. He uses his shoe stamps though, with plenty of half soles.

"On the trip home from the refinery I can cover 15 miles by day in an hour and a half, but it takes me longer in the cool of the evening."

He feels he is in proper condition he hopes to try to break A.L. Monteverde's transcontinental record of 79 days, 10 hours and 10 minutes.

He may wait until after shoe rationing to try that.

## Hamburg Raided Seven Times In Week

LONDON, July 30.—(AP)—Big United States bombers delivered a heavy attack on the Fieseler aircraft works at Kassel today, following up another tremendous assault last night upon burning Hamburg by British and Canadian planes operating "in very great strength."

Last night's heavy attack on Hamburg was the seventh in a week in a sustained effort to wipe Germany's second largest city off the map and blot out its great submarine works and other war uncertainties.

## Seeks To Block Escape Of Axis War Criminals

WASHINGTON, July 30.—(CP)—President Roosevelt, on behalf of the United Nations, served notice today on the neutral countries not to provide asylum for Mussolini, Hitler, Tojo or their fellow war criminals, in an obvious attempt to block an avenue of escape such as Kaiser Wilhelm trod in 1918.

At the same time, the President made it abundantly clear the Allies are prepared to talk peace—on the basic terms of unconditional surrender—with any Italian government or leaders who are not out-and-out Fascists and who can persuade the Italian government to lay down their arms without lapsing into a state of anarchy.

The President's statement, made at a press conference, was interpreted as removing all doubt concerning the House of Savoy or Premier Pietro Badoglio. He made it plain the personalities involved, apart from known Fascists, did not matter. The important thing was

The President's virtual ultimatum to the neutral states was aimed chiefly at Mussolini but it included all Axis leaders and subordinates whom the United Nations intend to prosecute in open courts for barbaric crimes in war time.

The warning was believed here to be directed particularly at Switzerland, Spain and Argentina because it was regarded as unlikely that either Turkey or Sweden would permit Mussolini to cross their borders for several days if he has been rumored here that the ex-Duce was attempting to get in Hamburg, where he is supposed to have money cached away, there have been persistent reports that he also has funds on deposit in Swiss banks. As far as Spain is concerned, it probably would welcome him more any other neutral country.

**How To Control Garden Slugs**

Like other pests, garden slugs are more easily controlled when they are small and few in number. Often they are numerous on heavy land where they do considerable damage to beans, lettuce, cabbage cauliflower, and such like crops. For control, the infested plants should be dusted with hydrated lime in the evening after the sun has gone down when the slugs have commenced feeding.

Another method of control is to spray the infested plants thoroughly with Bordeaux mixture is repellent to slugs, and if the foliage of the plants is completely covered many of the slugs will confine their intentions to weed growing in the field. Another method that has given satisfactory control in garden is a mixture of metaldeside and bran it is too expensive under field conditions. This material may be purchased ready mixed at most seed stores, under a definite trade name.

**Sir Barry Domville Released From Prison**

LONDON, July 30.—(CP)—Admiral Sir Barry Domville, retired, former director of British Naval Intelligence who has been detained in Briton prison camp under defence regulations since July, 1940 was released today.

Sir Barry and Lady Domville were arrested July 4, 1940. He was taken to Briton prison and she to Holloway prison. She was released after 16 months detention. Charges against them were not disclosed.

Sir Barry, who retired in 1936, went to Germany in 1937 to shoot Chamols with Heinrich Himmler, head of all German police organizations, and twice before that he was a guest of Hitler.

He was chairman of the pro-German organization "The Link" but long ago announced it had been dissolved.

A recent issue of the Egg and Poultry Market Report issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture states that next fall will be a real test of the ability of Canadian egg producers to meet consumer demand. With current wholesale prices at Vancouver and Halifax within seven cents of the ceiling prices and Montreal eight cents, Canadians continue to eat more eggs than ever before. Consumer demand normally falls off in the middle of October and November when storage eggs come on the market and higher prices prevail.

"This year there are no storage eggs, and with greater purchasing power, higher quality, and price not a restraining factor, consumer demand is likely to continue to an unusual degree. Producers are faced with the problem of providing the biggest possible volume of all eggs. Grading Stations, Industry Committees, Provincial Department, and College Extension Services are
