

# Capitals Down Abegweits 2-1

## Locals Outshoot And Have Edge In Play Over Visitors, But Bubar Proves Stumbling Block In Face Of Withering Attack.

"Daddy" Bubar may be one of the best goalies in the Northern Hockey League, and then again he may have stopped some wonderful plays during the season, and last night turned in another great exhibition, but had "Lady Luck" not intervened on several occasions during the tilt, it is a safe bet that his team, the Fredericton Capitals, would have returned to the Brunswick this morning a heavily beaten aggregation of hockey players. However, these things called "horsehoes," perfect strangers to Abegweits all winter, again failed to shake their hands last night as a result they skated from the ice on the small side of a 2-1 score, after edging the Capitals play throughout every period.

Captain Lefurgey was in the nets for Abegweits last night and turned in a sparkling game, the two goals being scored against him being of the variety that fans call impossible to stop. His clearing of loose pucks from the vicinity of his citadel was another feature of Lefurgey's performance. On more than one occasion he threw himself head first from the goal mouth to smother the puck with his stick pucks that were just waiting to be picked up by a speedy Capital forward.

Bubar, who turned aside 30 shots to Lefurgey's 19, was also on an even keel, and in the end, he added to the fact that the Capitals wouldn't behave for Abegweits, made his doughy "Daddy" a veritable stone wall. The writer counted seven shots, that according to all man Hoyle, should have hit the net, but the puck either bounced off Bubar while he was in a sitting position or bounded over the net in abundant drives. It was a tough task for Abegweits, who played winning hockey, but tough breaks seem to be the lot of the home team this season, and naturally they'll chalk up last night's among the many others.

With the exception of the first period, the game was utterly devoid of bumping, and during this session the Fredericton forwards were slowed up somewhat by the stiff bodying of Gross and Oliver. For the remaining two periods the visitors fought shy of the Abegweits defencemen, being content to rifle long drives from the blue line which Lefurgey took with ease. There were a few exceptions however, and one of these was when

Joe Beaton completely fooled the Oliver-Gross combine to go through plumb centre and register the opening goal.

The scores by both teams were realized in the middle frame. Fredericton opened the counting when Webster beat Lefurgey from close in on a pass from fast and heavy Ernie Mosher. This net twister was made at the eleven minute mark.

Four minutes from the above mentioned goal, Fredericton scored again, Beaton doing the trick unassisted after splitting the Abegweits defence wide open.

The lone Abegweits goal came one minute from the rest bell, Lawlor and Oliver figuring in the play which proved successful when Kane scored. It was the culmination of a three man attack that passed through the Capital defence like water through a sieve.

# LOOKING 'EM OVER

MAPLE LEAF IN PROUD POSITION

Of the 17 nations who are contending for major honors at Lake Placid the Maple Leaf stands today as the most prominent rival of the Stars and Stripes, who are presently leading the field. In yesterday's matches the Winnipeg Olympics defeated Poland by a decisive score. The day before they off-set the German challenge in a conclusive manner. In the opinion of many sport followers the Western team does not compare with others who have worn on their sweaters the garland of the northern challenge. Yet, in their first encounter with the most difficult opposition which they will face in hockey, they eked out a victory and emerged triumphant.

If the Canadians can maintain their stride they will sustain the splendid reputation made by the Granites, Varsity Grads, and Falcons. It is admitted that this year the Sons of the North are up against stiffer competition than they have ever faced before.

In the opinion of many critics the Western team could have been strengthened by additions to the forward line. Canada's contenders might have added a scoring punch which their representatives are admittedly lacking. Hamilton Tigers, who ran the Prairie team to a close second for Allan Cup honors last year, contained a number of outstanding players who would have been an asset to the Winnipeggers had they seen fit to incorporate them in their hockey machine.

Montreal, which embraces many of the outstanding stars of this game today, could also have contributed to the strength of the Olympic team had not C. A. H. A. officials been remiss in their duties. They could have gathered a squad to represent Canada stronger than anything the United States could put on the ice. The Americans sought from east to west to get the most powerful team that could represent them.

present them. Canada depended entirely upon the Allan Cup winners of last year. That team may or may not win. Should they succeed the Canadian public will accord them every expression of admiration and jubilation, but should they fail the growing criticism against the method of which the team was selected will be fairly justified.

A SEVERE LOSS TO THE LEAFS

Toronto Maple Leafs, riding along easily at the top of the heap in the Canadian Section of the National Hockey League, sustained a severe blow to their championship hopes when Charlie Conacher broke his hand in Detroit last night. A leader in the individual points-getting column and a player whose every effort carries a scoring threat, Conacher will be greatly missed. While the Leafs have held tenaciously to the section lead after a shaky start last fall, they have defended their lead at a high cost in man power.

Not long ago "Red" Horner, fiery thatched defence player, whose sturdy checking and aggressive play was a great asset, had his shoulder fractured. Now it is Conacher, an invaluable member of the Leaf's famed "Kid" forward line, and it will be several weeks before his hand is sufficiently mended to allow him back in action.

Meanwhile Canadians are moving along at a steady clip and are now but two points behind the Leafs and the same number ahead of Eddie Gerard and his Star-Spangled Americans.

### Ecuador Off The Gold Standard

QUAYAQUITO, Ecuador, Feb. 10.—Ecuador went off the gold standard today until next November 10 and the Central Bank was ordered to call in all its foreign deposits for conversion to gold.

Under the suspension exporters expected to pay their duties in gold and export collections will be deposited in the Central Bank.

### Schooner Seized Within 3 Mile Limit

FREDERICTON, N. B., Feb. 10.—(By The Canadian Press)—Argument for the appellant was completed today before the appeal of New Brunswick, considering the case of the King versus Stephen Burt, of Queen's Harbor, Nfld., captain of the liquor laden Newfoundland schooner Telephone, seized near St. John several months ago.

Counsel for Burt contended the Telephone was outside the three mile limit at the time of seizure, and that the magistrate convicting Burt had no jurisdiction in the case. Deputy Attorney General Hartley, who began argument on behalf of the Crown and expects to finish tomorrow, contended the Bay of Fundy was British and thus under jurisdiction of the province, and that this jurisdiction applied within three mile limit. Contention of the Crown is that the schooner was seized within this limit.

# Sir Malcolm Will Endeavor To Break His Own Record

NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 10.—Forty eight years old, his hair thinning around the temples but his lust for speed undiminished, Sir Malcolm Campbell is here to risk his life in an assault on his own land speed record of 245.733 miles an hour, established a year ago on the sands of Daytona Beach, Fla.

The popular Briton, who had dedicated more than half his life to the conquest of space, arrived today aboard the Berengaria. A brief visit with friends here, and he will be away for Daytona Beach, hopeful of hurdling his Bluebird II down the sands at the greatest speed yet attained on land.

The eight year old Bluebird, originally built to travel 180 miles an hour, already is in Florida, attended by four mechanics who accompanied it from England. It has been slightly revamped since Sir Malcolm established the record in February 5, a year ago. Its nose has been sharpened and its horsepower increased from 1,450, to 1,500.

# Canada's Lady Skaters Again Shatter Records

Leila Brooks-Potter And Jean Wilson Make New Marks But Lose Out In Finals—Other Events.

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 10.—Two new world records were set within a few minutes this afternoon at the Olympic winter games by Mrs. Leila Brooks-Potter and Jean Wilson, both of Toronto, Ont., but victory eluded them in the final of the event, a 1,500 metre demonstration race.

Miss Wilson had hung up a new mark by racing around the ice oval in the first heat in 2 minutes 54.1-10 seconds, only to applaud the sparkling effort of her team-mate a few minutes later as Leila cut another 2-10 seconds off the former record.

Kit Klein, tall and winsome United States speeder, edged Jean Wilson out in the final after Mrs. Brooks-Potter fell a short distance from the finish line. She was in the lead at the time. Geraldine MacKie also from Toronto, breezed home in fourth place, a few feet behind Helen Bina, of Chicago. Prior to the start of the race Vella stumbled and fell heavily to the ice in a trial sprint. But notwithstanding a sore back and throbbing headache, she refused to quit and in setting the new record spurred into a commanding lead which she held unchanged to the finish. Her time was considered as particularly outstanding as the ice was a bit soft and rough.

U. S. Pucksters Win 8-0

In the only game of the Olympic hockey schedule today, the United States squad kept right at the heels of the pace-setting Winnipeg, Canada's representatives, by overwhelming the German entry under an 8-0 drubbing. The U. S. team has only lost one game, the opening match, which they dropped to the Canadians in overtime by a 2-1 score.
