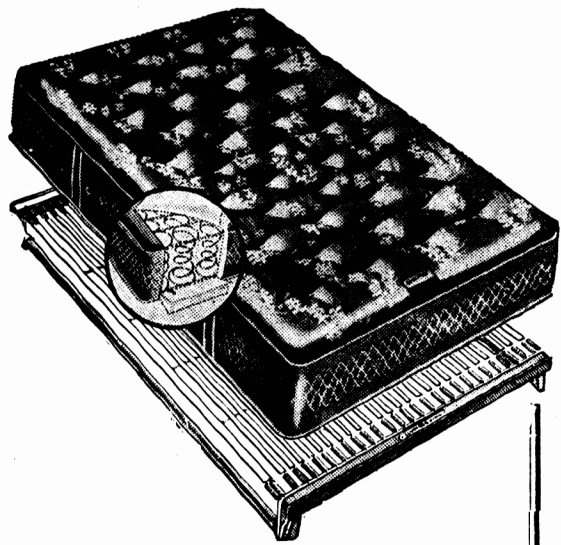

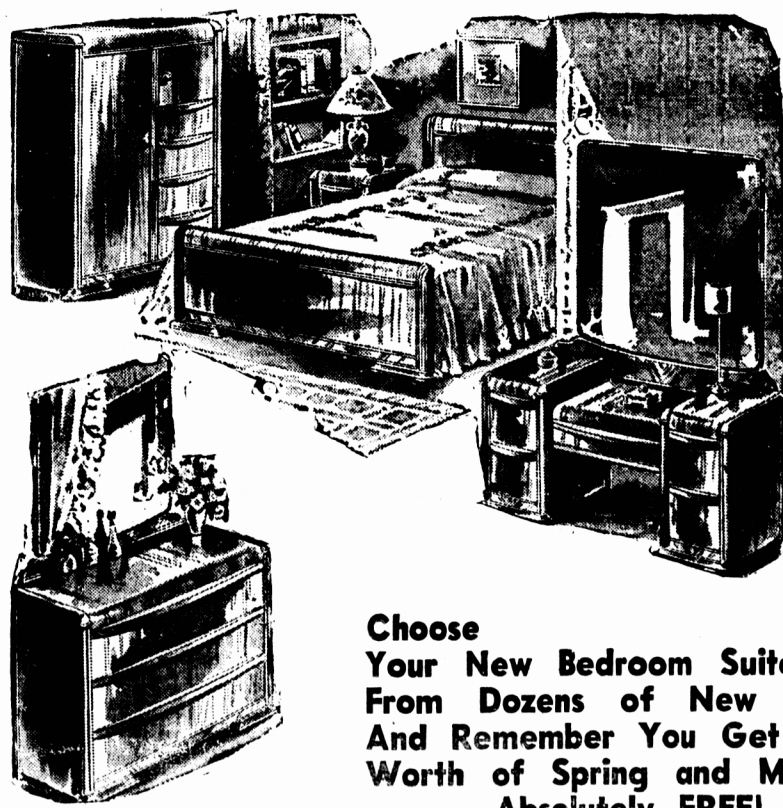

Weekly Wages Hit Record Average

OTTAWA, Oct. 26 — (CP) — Industrial weekly wages in Canada hit a record average of \$40.88 at Sept. 1, the Bureau of Statistics

reported today. This announcement came two days after the Bureau had reported employment in the Dominion at an all-time high of 5,042,000 job-holders in the first week of September. The wage represented a 20-cent increase from the previous high at Aug. 1. Six Provinces showed gains from a month previously, with New

Brunswick, Quebec and Saskatchewan registering decreases. Prince Edward Island's index rose from 105.4 to 105.3, Nova Scotia's from 106.8 to 107. In New Brunswick the drop was from 103 to 102. In all Provinces, however, the Sept. 1 index was advanced from that of a year previously. In manufacturing alone, the figures for both employment and

average weekly wage were a little better than in industry generally. The employment index was 209, up about three points from a month previously. Average weekly earnings were at \$41.47, two cents better than at Aug. 1 and comparing with \$37.17 a year before.
