At his home at Montague on the 15th August, 1906, Moses Pearson passed to his eternal reward in the 60th year of his age. The deceased was born in the County of Cornwall, England, and when quite young came with his parents to Prince Edward Island. In 1861 he married Helen Carver of Pownall, and to this happy union were born fourteen children, ten of whom together with their mother and ten grandchildren are still living. At an early age Mr. Pearson became a member of the B. C. Church and continued so until the union of that body with the Methodist Church of which he was a consistent and faithful member at the time of his death. He was highly respected and esteemed in all the relationship of life. As a husband and father he was loving and self-sacrificing as a neighbour kind and obliging, and as a Christian zealous and self-sacrificing. His whole life was influenced by the example of his Saviour. His faith was clear and strong and he felt that death to him was but a translation to the heavenly realm. His memory is blessed and his friends and neighbors feel it a great privilege to have been associated with so good a man. The funeral services were most appropriate and were conducted by Rev. R. G. Sinclair and A. J. McNell of the Presbyterian Church. The funeral was largely attended and his remains were deposited in the beautiful casket at Lower Montague, there to remain till the resurrection morn.—Com.

BIG SCHOONER PROBABLY LOST

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 12.—It is feared that the large four-masted schooner Albert C. Hunt, which left Do ton, Mass., August 10th for St. Ann's, C. B., and has not yet arrived, has gone to the bottom with all hands, as under ordinary circumstances the schooner should have completed the passage within a week. The schooner was coming here to load a cargo of gypsum for Boston, which was being shipped by the Victoria Gypsum Co. She is described as being practically a new vessel, having only been launched less than a year ago in the United States. She was about seven hundred tons register and was owned in Boston.
