If any of us should chance to be despondent, let him go for confidence to the men in the trenches. If for a moment he lacks heart, let him go to the wounded in the hospitals for courage. If we seek a standard for the nation's spirit, let us remember the discipline and heroism of the men who lined up on the deck of the Tyndareus when sinking.

"The German people are fighting with desperation under the belief engendered and fostered by the military autocracy that we seek to crush Germany and terminate her national existence. No such purpose was or could be in the minds of British people to crush in that sense a nation of seventy millions. Germany at the beginning of the war was the most powerful military state in the world, and the idea of successful aggression against her was unthinkable. Confident in that strength the Germans, following blindly the behests of militarism, entered the war for world domination.

Germany Must be Taught

"Germany, soul and people, must be taught before the end that military aggression is neither legitimate nor profitable, and world domination impossible, and that treaties sacred to public conscience would not permit rape on small, weak nations, and would not tolerate the horrible methods of barbarity that characterized the passage of German armies and the occupancy of conquered territory. Finally, there is a world conscience which commands and can arouse a force sufficient to subdue any nation that runs amuck. This lesson must be thoroughly learned by the Germans. We have not taken up arms in vain. Let Germany so set her house in order that this change of ideal and purpose can be realized, or let her make reparation for the evil she has wrought. Let her give adequate guarantees for the future. Thus, but not otherwise, can she have peace. For this, but not to crush her, the Allies are fighting. We have gathered together here from the ends of the earth to take council with you of the Mother Land, upon the needs of the situation, so as better to coordinate our common efforts and communicate our common purpose. When first I spoke to you in 1912 I took the leave to put forward certain views respecting future constitutional relations. Two years ago I emphasized the same conditions without dwelling upon them. The purpose which I had then at heart still remains steadfast. It may be that in the shadow of war we do not clearly realize the measure of recent constitutional development. I shall not attempt to anticipate any conclusion which may be reached by the war conference now sitting, a conference embracing India now for the first time who has taken her place at the National Council of Emperors, as well as all the great dominions except Australia, whose absence is deeply regretted. Except with regard to India, the summing of that conference does not mark a new stage of constitutional development. Its present duty is to consider and where necessary to determine general principles of conduct to the position which has arisen in conditions afterwards. I address my own concern, which in some cases have intimate relation to the war and from the summoning of the war cabinet.

Is Flexible Instrument

"The British constitution is the most flexible instrument the Government ever devised. The office of Prime Minister is invested with a power and authority which under new conditions is demanding progress and development which are of inestimable value. The recent exercise of that great authority has brought about an advance which may contain and define the method of constitutional development in the immediate future. time in the Empire's history there are sitting in London two Cabinets, both properly constituted, and both exercising well-defined powers. Over each the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom presides. To its deliberations have been summoned representatives of empires under self-government.

Meet on Equal Terms

As Dominions we meet there on terms of equality, under the presidency of the First Minister of the United Kingdom. We meet there as equals, although Great Britain presides, "Primus inter pares." Ministers from six nations sit around the council board, all of them responsible to their respective Parliaments and to the people they represent. Each nation has its voice upon questions of common concern and highest importance.

For many years the thought of statesmen and students in every part of the Empire has centered around the question of future constitutional relations, and it may be that now as in the past the necessity imposed by great events, has given its answer. The Imperial War Cabinet as constituted today has been summoned for definite and specific purposes as publicly stated, which involve questions of vital concern to the whole Empire. With the constitution of that Cabinet a new era has dawned, and a new page in history written. It is not for me to prophesy as to the future significance of these pregnant events, but those who have given their thought and energy to every effort for the full constitutional development of the overseas nations may be pardoned for believing that they can discern therein the birth of a new and greater Imperial Commonwealth.

General Smuts, following Borden, paid a generous tribute to Canada's contribution. He did not conceal from himself the position was a grave one. The Germans were now putting forth their maximum effort in the submarine campaign.

GET COURAGE FROM MEN AT THE FRONT, SAYS SIR ROBERT

Stirring Speech Made by the Premier at a Dinner Given in London

DOES NOT MINIMIZE PERIL FACING EMPIRE

LONDON, April 10.—Premier Borden and his colleagues, General Smuts, and other delegates at the Imperial Conference, were lunched at the House of Commons by the Empire Parliamentary Association, the Colonial Secretary presiding.

"Little more than twenty months have elapsed since I last addressed you," said Sir Robert. "We had some realization, but hardly an adequate conception, of even the tremendous task still before us. In these islands you have risen splendidly to the need. We of the Dominions have striven also to do our part. I then reminded you that 250,000 men had joined the colors from overseas nations. I can tell you today not less than 1,000,000 men in the Dominions have taken up arms for the Empire. The Canadian force in Europe then numbered 75,000. I am proud to tell you today Canada has sent forth more than 125,000 men. Our total enlistments exceed 400,000, and in the Canadian force alone more than 300,000 have left the shores of the Dominion. Their achievement under the strictest test has been splendidly worthy of traditions which are their heritage."

Blow Must Be Met

"There is no time, nor is this the occasion to dwell upon phases of the war, since my last visit. The most recent had its inception in the first of February last in an attempt to starve into submission the people of these islands by ruthless sinking of all ships entering a wide ocean area around the United Kingdom. I am wholly confident this attempt will fail, but I am equally confident to insure such a failure, people of the Empire, especially these islands, must realize the peril is a substantial one. It must be met with the spirit which will not shrink from timely self sacrifice. I speak in no despondent mood, but as one who is disposed to face realities. The enemy are staking everything upon this last throw of the dice; all their energies being concentrated upon this year's campaign. Whether on land or sea any flagging of our spirit, or any lack of effort, disastrous at any time, would be fatal now."

No Sacrifice Too Great

"Such any sacrifice or self-denial, however stern, which may be imposed upon those at home, how do these compare with the privation and danger and suffering too often the supreme sacrifice among those who hold the lines in France or elsewhere."
