General Pershing Warns Americans

BOSTON, Dec 19—Addressing the Women's Republican club of Massachusetts today, General John J. Pershing said that "dangerous elements are moving toward a revolution in America" both openly and secretly and that because national problems have not been thoroughly discussed "there have sprung into so many women's clubs these undermining and disruptive tendencies toward radicalism of all sorts. "Pacifism, the disease which strikes but at constitutional government", he added "was a particular one of these tendencies. "As we look out upon the world today," Gen. Pershing said, "we find complicated situations in middle Europe, in the Near East and in the Orient. The nations lately at war seem ready to fly at each other's throats, and a war more terrible than the last is openly predicted. Suspicion, jealousy and hatred are followed by repudiation, calumny and threats of war. It is not inconceivable that America might again take up arms in defense of the principles of liberty and justice which inspired our action in 1917. It seems unnecessary further to discuss these possibilities but it would be simple folly for us now to revert to our proverbial listlessness. "It is surprising that any of our people should be so simple minded as to think that complete disarmament on our part would induce other nations to follow. As a matter of fact, we were practically disarmed in 1917 and we are quite alone. "We are now really down to bed rock," the speaker said in urging that adequate support be given the regular army, the national guard and the organized reserves.

RICHARD AYLWARD

A gloom was cast over Morell East on Nov. 15, when death claimed as its victim the person of Richard Aylward at the advanced age of 82 years. Although in failing health for the last few years, his death came as a shock to his many relatives and friends. The late Mr. Aylward was a man of kind and cheerful disposition. A good neighbor he was always ready and willing to offer help to any who needed his assistance. In his illness he was frequently visited by his devoted pastor, Rev. Father Rooney, who administered to him the sacred rites of the Catholic Church, of which he was a faithful member. He leaves to mourn two sisters, Mrs. Mary A. Ronaghan, Ruskin; Annie of Charlottetown; also five daughters and three sons; Mrs. M. J. Flynn, Milburn; Margaret and Ella, Boston; Mrs. Charlie Cross, and Libbie, Lynn, Mass.; William of Chelsea; Richard and James at home. His funeral to St. Joseph's church despite the bad roads, was largely attended, the funeral Mass being celebrated by Rev. Father Rooney. JOHN MONTGOMERY

"VILLAGE BLACKSMITH" And the muscles of his brawny arms Were strong as iron bands.

The death of John Montgomery for over half-century he "village blacksmith" at Bear River, last Wednesday is of more than passing interest. In the long span of 52 years he worked faithfully and well for his rural, neighbor-customers and in that lengthy space of time—almost for two generations—he ingratiated himself into the hearts of the people. "Week in week out you could hear his bellows roar." "Without a year, a month, or scarcely a week's break John Montgomery could be found by his customers in his smithy "under the spreading chestnut tree." What's more he was an extremely expert farrier and many a crippled horse did Montgomery cure and improve by his great skill the farrier's art.—And like Longfellow's Village Blacksmith, Montgomery could be found every Sunday without fail in his parish church at divine services either in the choir or in his pew. Up to a couple of weeks previous to his demise, he had been steadily at work in his forge. Though not as well as usual this fall, still he kept at work. He received a bad kick from a horse in the thigh, early in the fall, and later cut his foot with an axe. Both injuries falling simultaneously affected his system and it was thought blood poison set in, which with other chronic ailments ultimately caused his death. Mr. John J. Montgomery the well and favoured known horseshoer in Souris, is a son of his. Another son residing with him and who will likely succeed the father in the forge, all of the boys are good smiths. His funeral on Friday, to St. Margaret's was largely attended. The parish priest and close friend Father McPherson, permed the religious services both in church and at the grave side. R. I. P.
