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Message From Mrs. McEachren To War Workers

The following is a message to Red Cross women war workers from The National Chairman, Mrs. Clara F. McEachren of Toronto, who paid a short visit to this province on Thursday of this week at the conclusion of her eastern tour which also included an inspection of the work being done in Newfoundland by the Canadian Red Cross: "We are at a stage in the work where it is almost impossible to know what we will be called upon to do. This year will be the testing time. There will be a sharp increase in casualties and there will be more wounds to dress and more comforts to provide. This means more and more work for the women of Canada through their Red Cross. We may suddenly be asked for things we have not been making, and we must be ready to respond to the call. I firmly believe that every one should have a holiday, but I am convinced that our workers all across Canada should arrange to carry on during the summer by taking along with them some knitting or light sewing. Turtleneck sweaters are still required in large numbers, and more gloves—we have never yet had enough of these to meet the demand. "We realize that it is very difficult for the general public to understand why there have been so many changes in Red Cross instructions and work but 90 per cent of these changes is due to the fact that conditions on the battle front are constantly changing and those who are actually working at the scene of action send their recommendations as to the best types of dressings, comforts and garments to be made. It is nothing made by Red Cross because the women in charge think a certain article is a 'good idea' or a sound reason behind every change and every piece of work that is turned out. For five years the women of Canada have remained faithful to their task. It is not a glamorous job, but real hard work. No medals are bestowed, the only reward is a feeling of satisfaction that comes with the performance of a loving duty well done."
