**Westville Wins From Sydney Nationals**

SYDNEY, August 20.—Westville, Nova Scotia Baseball Champions, won the first game of the Eastern section of the 1925 playoffs when they decisively defeated the Sydney Nationals 9 to 2 here this afternoon.

A cloudy sky prevailed during the morning and it was doubtful up to the last moment whether the game would be played or not. However, with the first inning over, Old King Sol made his appearance and presented the players with a perfect afternoon, with a south-east wind leading a cool effect to the spectators, who numbered over the 1600 mark.

This afternoon's game was a good one to watch except for the third Westville inning when the visitors opened the scoring with five runs on four hits and three errors. McCachers' wild throw to first paved the way for the five runs. Westville scored again in the sixth when two hits and two errors let one tally cross the plate. Again in the eighth the miners made a fierce onslaught against McPhee and score three runs on two hits and two errors.

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**At Rotary**

Mr. Davis Hunter of Grinshy, Ont., was the speaker at the Rotary luncheon yesterday and the guests present were Rotarian Johnstone of Norfolk, Virginia, J. J. Storey of Winsloe, ex-Rotarian J. H. Malcolm, Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Yarmouth, (who contributed a solo to the musical programme), Rotarian Dr. G. Johnston of Norfolk, Va., Director of the Experimental Station of that city, Mr. F. B. Kinsman of Wolfville, in charge of the Illustration Stations of Nova Scotia, and Rotarian F. T. Thomas of Fredericton; also the following operators of the Illustration Stations of Prince Edward Island: Messrs MacIntyre, Montague; MacKenzie, Ross, Valley; Daley, Long Grogg, West Devon; Noonan, Richmond; MacEwen, St. Peter's; and John L. Clark, Rustico.

Mr. Hunter took as his subject "The Dairy Cow" making no reference to any particular breed. He arrived here on Friday on his first visit to the island, and his tour through the Province had revealed to him the wonderful opportunity which we have for dairy farming. Dairying and for raising can be combined, he believed, for the benefit of the Province as a whole, and he was glad to know that ranchers are using considerable amount of milk. He was impressed by the excellent crops and the fact that our soil is easily worked. No novice is a better opportunity for successful dairying than Prince Edward Island. No farmer, dairier and for raising economically shipped to the market than dairy products. In other provinces dairy farmers are invariably succeeding and out on the prairies where a man can buy a few acres and sell a bit of cream a day, he is able to pay his taxes and also have a margin to spare; his main source of revenue of course being wheat. Mr. Hunter advised the farmers to keep six good cows rather than twelve inferior ones. The farmer will be happier at the end of the year, and have better profits. The dairy cow is a revenue bringer for three hundred and sixty days a year, and bank managers declare that the man with a few dairy cows as a rule seldom asks for big loans to help them carry on until their crop is sold. Farmers should get the best bred cattle more extensively.

He aroused applause from the meeting when he said that the Disease Free Area Plan was the most wonderful thing that had ever been tried out in any cattle areas. In other parts of Canada where these areas are established they can't begin to supply the demand for pure bred stock. They have advanced in price from \$25 to \$50 per head, and grade cows have advanced proportionately. He believed that when a district is rendered free from disease people will use more freely because they are assured of their purity.

In closing he urged greater co-operation between the business man and the farmer. The average farmer is inclined to grumble and knock. However, he is not a salesman; and business men who are good salesmen would advise him in mutual advantage to both.

Rotarian Johnston made a short address conveying the greetings of the Norfolk Club and dwelling on the inter-relationship existing between the various industries. The Norfolk Rotary Club is behind a movement to bring the professional and business men and farmers closer together; and the State Chamber of Commerce is endeavouring to promote among other things the betterment of agriculture in Virginia.

Rotarian J. O. Hyndman also made a few remarks regarding co-operation, and referred to the meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade in Summerside next Wednesday.
